

PLANE SEARCH UNSUCCESSFUL

Hunt Conducted From Four Bases

Fliers Grounded Again by Increasing Storm Conditions

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 21 (AP)—Search for a missing army bomber carrying seven men was centered in the region of Mt. Hood and Mt. St. Helens today as increasing cloudiness indicated storm conditions before nightfall again would force abandonment of searching flights by more than 30 army planes.

Bases have been established at Portland, Ore., Pearson field at Vancouver, Wash., Medford, Ore., and Sacramento, Cal. Planes from McChord field, home base of the bomber; Portland and Vancouver are concentrating their search in southwestern Washington and western Oregon. Those from Medford are scanning the Rogue river valley and the northern slopes of the Siskiyou mountains. From Sacramento, army bombers with observers peering through the bomb bays, are flying over the southern extremities of the Siskiyou.

No word has been received from the twin motored Douglas bomber since it left McChord field Thursday morning on a flight to the air corps bombing range at Muroc dry lake in southern California. The search will continue until the plane is found, army authorities said, although lowering visibility may temporarily ground the searchers.

Rain was predicted for northern California, western Oregon and southwestern Washington today, with snows falling as low as 4500 feet.

SHIPPING LOSS REMAINS LOW

Week's Total Is Below Average

Nine Vessels Sunk During Period Ending January 12

London, Jan. 21 (AP)—British shipping losses were well below the weekly war average for the fifth straight week during the seven days which ended at midnight January 12, the admiralty said today.

British losses for the week ended January 12 were nine ships totaling 30,226 tons, the admiralty said. There were no allied or neutral losses due to German or Italian action.

County AAA Report Made at Corvallis

Redmond, Jan. 21—A report on the AAA program for 1940 and recommendations for changes in the 1941 and 1942 program for Deschutes county, were presented at the state AAA conference in Corvallis last week by members of the Deschutes county delegation.

Changes the committee recommended for 1941 and 1942 in the AAA program for Deschutes county include making sulphur available as a grant of aid; the application of mulching materials to alfalfa, pasture, and potato lands; and an increase in soil building payments for farms which do not have a potato or wheat allotment of over 50 acres.
