

STOCKS DROP IN ACTIVE DAY

Labor Demands Cause Steels to Drop

Turnover on Market Best Since Tenth of January

New York, Jan. 21 (UP)—Stocks made an irregular decline today in the most active turnover since January 10.

Stocks opened irregular and then advanced under lead of steels. When the rise failed to attract new buying traders sold and prices broke. Steels were hardest hit with U. S. Steel falling more than 2 points from its high before meeting support.

Weakness in steels was attributed mainly to labor demands on U. S. Steel and Crucible Steel. Selling spread to other sections. Railroads were exceptions. Southern Pacific featured in activity and made a small gain on news the navy department had purchased one of the road's steamships.

Oils held well with considerable trading in Standard Oil (New Jersey.) Paramount headed amusements in turnover and held steady. Utility issues eased slightly. Mercantile shares were mixed. Chemicals weakened with losses of 3 points and more in Du Pont, Dow Chemical and Allied Chemical. Union Carbide and Monsanto were off a point. Columbian Carbon lost 1 1/2.

Most aircrafts gave up small amounts. Coppers eased with Anaconda active. American Airlines had a loss of more than 3 points.

Pirelli of Italy plunged 7 points to 61 on two transactions and Sloss Sheffield was down 6. Declines of 1 to more than 2 points were made in Cleveland Graphite, Consolidated Aircraft, Minneapolis Honeywell, Penney, Sun Oil,

Norfolk, Va. (UP)—Forty-eight "knights of the kettle" have been graduated from the training school for army cooks at nearby Langley Field after a two-month course that covered everything from setting up a field kitchen in a driving rainstorm to figuring a close kitchen budget.

Among other things, the student cooks were taught the art of feeding soldiers on as little as 41 cents a day. Most of the first "graduates"—now designated mess sergeants, first cooks or second cooks—soon will be on their way to stations in Puerto Rico or other air bases.
