

KEARNS SEEKS NEW DEMPSEY

Met Jack in Tavern in Oakland

Bear-Comiskey Bout Last September Claimed Turning Point

New York (U.S.)—Jack Kearns, his two million dollar fortune earned from the prize ring just a pleasant memory, trods the pugilistic trail again, seeking to revive another memory—a heavyweight fighter good enough to reach that same leather-pushing pinnacle to which he piloted Jack Dempsey.

Kearns, whose fame and fortune for a time seemed endlessly entwined with Dempsey's, lost his fortune in several different ways around the country. Now approaching 55, he is firmly convinced that the \$30,000 he dug up for Maxie Baer to knock out Pat Comiskey in Jersey City last September has given him a good grip on the comeback ladder.

"Ol' Doc" classes the claims of those members of the boxing fraternity, who call his Baer-Comiskey match a financial flop, as pure professional jealousy. According to him, it brought him \$60,000 which compares with the Baer-Tony Galento fight in the same city by the 20th Century Sporting club at a more favorable season and under much better climatic conditions.

"Comiskey collected \$8,000 from us," Kearns said, "probably the biggest dough he ever got. And not only that, we polished off every single obligation remaining from the show. Truthfully, I did not make a red cent for two months of work but the fun was worth it."

Kearns admitted he had no exclusive contracts to start the money rolling in once more but he is prepared to corral the best talent he can find even if he has to big in the open market and put up a guarantee.

"They gave me the old 'raised eyebrows' treatment when I talked about putting up that guarantee for Baer," he said. "But I've really got me some backers now. They can make that dough look like subway fare."

He said that he had no stadium contracts in the east but could present bouts indoors in Chicago and outdoors in Chicago, Miami or San Francisco.

"All you have to do is be on the level with your public and you can't miss," he remarked. "That's the way I was with Dempsey. Incidentally, do you know how I met Jack?"

"I was in a tavern in Oakland, Calif., when some rough-housing starter. The first punch put me on the floor, down but not out. What a riot went on around me after that! Some hardy gent was single-handedly cleaning up the place and did a thorough job."

"When he was all finished he dragged me down the street and revived me. When I asked him who he was, he said: 'Dempsey's the name—Jack Dempsey.'"

"That was enough for me. It took me about a tenth of a second to realize that this kid must be a natural fighter if he could stop a brawl all by himself. That's how we began."

Kearns still doesn't believe that Joe Louis can take a punch like Dempsey could and said he would spend the rest of his days trying to find a heavyweight to prove it.

Bend Engineers Ask For Jobs in Redmond

Redmond, Feb. 13—Smithson and Gilbert, Bend engineers, appeared before the Redmond city council at its regular meeting Tuesday night, in connection with engineering work which may be needed by the city in carrying out the swimming pool and park project, and also in making a survey for street improvement.

The Bend engineering firm had been hired by the city to make necessary plans for the construction of the new water reservoir, on which work has already been started. They also asked for the job of preparing plans for the park project, bonds for which are to be sold this month.

The engineers also asked for the work of preparing a comprehensive survey of street, drainage and sewer needs of the city, which would be needed if a street improvement project is undertaken. They were asked to submit a price for such a survey.

Further grading and filling work on B street, where incoming traffic from Northwest Redmond is now routed, was asked of the council by a delegation of farmers from the Northwest Redmond district. This work will be undertaken as soon as possible, indicated F. W. Landaker, street commissioner.

The meeting was adjourned until next Tuesday night, February 18, by Mayor W. F. Hardison. At this time bids on the park project bonds will be opened.

CAPITAL GAINS AND LOSSES

The term "capital assets" is defined as the property held by the taxpayer (whether or not connected with his trade or business), but does not include stock in trade of the taxpayer or property of a kind which would properly be included in the inventory of the taxpayer if on hand at the close of the taxable year, or property held by the taxpayer primarily for sale to customers in the ordinary course of his trade or business, or property, used in the trade or business, of a character which is subject to the allowance for depreciation.

Capital gains and losses are classified as "short-term" (applicable to capital assets held for 18 months or less) and "long-term" (applicable to capital assets held for more than 18 months). Such gains and losses are taken into consideration in the percentages shown on the return, based upon the period of time during which the assets are held.

Short-term capital losses are allowable only to the extent of short-term capital gains. However, any net short-term capital loss (not in excess of the net income for the taxable year) may be carried over to the succeeding year and applied against the short-term capital gains not already offset by short-term capital losses in such year. The carry-over is restricted to one year.

In the case of a net long-term capital gain or loss, an alternative tax is imposed with respect to a gain if such tax is less than the normal tax and surtax on net income, and in the event of a loss, such alternative tax is imposed if greater than the normal tax and surtax on net income. Where a taxpayer derives a net long-term capital gain and computes his tax under section 117 (c) (1), relating to alternative taxes, the base for determining the 15 per cent limitation on the charitable contributions deduction provided by section 23 (a) (3) is "net income."

Where a taxpayer sustains a net long-term capital loss and computes his tax under section 117 (c) (2), the base for determining the charitable contributions deduction is "ordinary net income," that is, "net income" plus the amount of the net long-term capital loss, and the base for determining the earned income credit is "ordinary net income" as adjusted for the charitable contributions deduction.

COIN PROVES TO BE ROMAN

Old Piece of Money Is Found in Montana

May Have Been Brought To America by Early Spaniards

Choteau, Mont. (U.S.)—Nine-year-old Mark Bruno, Jr., little realized when he picked up an odd-looking "pebble" that the object in his hand was to provide an apparently unsolvable mystery and suggest a link with the early days of the Christian era.

Mark, son of a logger, found the "pebble" near his log cabin home at the base of Ear Mountain, 24 miles west of here along the Teton river. He showed the object, about an inch and one-eighth in diameter and coated with dirt and gravel, to his father.

Believing it was a coin, Bruno, Sr., sent it to the U. S. mint, which returned it with the information that it was bronze, not gold, and the suggestion it be submitted to the Smithsonian institution at Washington, for examination.

The institution turned Mark's pebble over to an expert, who declared it was a coin, all right—a coin struck during the reign of the Roman emperor Hadrian, between 117 and 138 A. D.

Relief, the head of Hadrian easily can be discerned, while the reverse bears the figure of a woman and the letter S, which apparently denoted the coin's value.

Although the coin has been identified, an explanation of how it came to be at the foot of a mountain in the Rockies more than 1,800 years after it was cast still is lacking.

Mark found the coin in a "tepee ring" along what was known as the "Great North trail," over which thousands of travelers moved north from the warmer southern regions to the Arctic circle centuries before the Blackfoot Indians came.

The tepee rings are rings of stones, buried and then exposed by erosion. The Blackfoot and other northern plains tribes say they did not make the rings and that they were left by some earlier race.

One explanation offered was that the coin was brought from Europe by Spaniards early in American history, or by trappers or explorers, and found its way into the hands of someone traversing the Great North trail.

Nurse Wins \$8,000 And Acre of Oil Land

San Francisco, Feb. 13 (U.S.)—Mrs. Katherine MacDonnell, Tigard nurse, won \$8,000 and an acre of oil land in her suit for \$5,000,000 against the California Lands, Inc., but her attorneys said the decision would be appealed.

Federal Judge A. F. St. Sure rejected her contention fraud had been practiced by the Bank of America subsidiary, but awarded an acre upon which her house stands and damages for trespassing, the boring for oil on her property, erection of tanks, building of roads and construction of pumps.

Mrs. MacDonnell sued for 40 acres in the Santa Maria oil fields, claiming she bought the property in ignorance of the fact California Lands retained mineral rights. She was supported in court by A. M. Johnson, Chicago millionaire who is the reputed "angel" of Death Valley Scotty.
