

WAR SITUATION CALLED GRAVE

New Development in War East Seen

Austria's Cabinet Called to Receive of Telegrams

Sydney, Australia, Feb. 13 (AP)—Austria's cabinet today adjourned a meeting of the war council to consider a new Eastern situation "of the utmost gravity."

It was disclosed that chiefs of the fighting services and Air Marshal Sir Herbert Brooke-Popham, British commander-in-chief in the Near East, would attend the war cabinet meeting.

The cabinet meeting was adjourned immediately after receipt of telegrams dealing with the situation abroad.

A special statement the cabinet issued:

"We think we should tell the people in the considered opinion of the cabinet the war has moved new stages involving the utmost gravity. Implications of the existing situation are to be described as of the most serious importance. Effective preparatory measures taken for Australia's safety are rendered essential the greatest effort of preparedness the country has ever made."

It was disclosed that Air Marshal Sir Herbert Brooke-Popham, British commander-in-chief in the Far East, had been invited to attend tomorrow's war cabinet meeting.
