## Eritrean Port Raided By Air Force

### Second Crossing of Juba River in Somaliland Accomplished

Cairo, Feb. 21 (AP)—A second crossing of the Juba river, Italian Somaliland, by British troops was reported in a headquarters communique today, and the Middle East command of the royal air force reported punishing blows against the Italians in East Africa, especially in a raid on Massawa, main port for Eritrea.

South African troops crossed the Juba under fire two days ago, intensifying their threat to Mogadishu, capital of Italian Somaliland. The second crossing, reported today, was said to have occurred north of the scene of the original operation.

Headquarters said that operations from both British bridgeheads across the Juba were developing satisfactorily.

The RAF said that in the rain on Massawa a number of grounded Italian planes were damaged and a large gasoline dump was set on fire.

Recapitulating recent operations the army command said that in fighting south of Benghazi after the fall of the Libyan base into British hands the army of the Nile destroyed or captured 107 Italian medium tanks.

A communique said that from Jan. 20 to Feb. 20 in Eritrea the British captured 47 Italian officers, including a brigade commander, 698 Italians of other ranks and 5,576 colonial (native) troops.

"In addition many prisoners have been taken in the areas of the blue Nile, the upper Nile and Gofjam (western Ethiopia)," the communique added.
