

U-BOAT BASES BOMBED AGAIN

Raid on Lorient 48th Of War

Bad Weather Prevents Air Force Operations Into Germany

London, March 21 (Special)—Large fires and many explosions were caused by royal air force planes in a raid during the night on the German submarine base at Lorient, on the invasion coast, the air ministry said today.

It was the second straight night raid on the big U-boat base, and the 48th of the war.

Bombing was centered on the dock area.

The ministry disclosed that coastal command planes yesterday bombed and machine gunned a number of German motor torpedo boats and a German patrol vessel off the Frisian islands in the North sea. The crew of the patrol vessel took to life boats, the ministry said. Two German planes which attempted to interfere were driven off.

A German supply ship was bombed and machine gunned off the south coast of Norway yesterday, the ministry said.

It was understood that bad weather prevented royal air force offensive operations against Germany during the night.

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MARCH 23-29 WILL BE CLEANUP WEEK

Cooperation in Job Asked By Mayor Simpson

Cooperating with the Oregon roadside council, which has designated the week of March 23-29 inclusive, as "cleanup week" throughout the state, Mayor Fred S. Simpson has set aside the same dates for Bend's annual cleanup.

"Like Oregon as a whole, Bend is justly proud of its natural scenery, but a constant battle must be carried on to preserve this scenery and to keep the town neat and trim," Mayor Simpson declared. He also pointed to the fact that Bend this year will be host to half a dozen different groups holding their annual conventions here and made a plea for the full cooperation of residents in putting the town in order.

Mayor Simpson said that with the return of spring "our citizens as good householders should tidy up their dwellings and premises and roadsides, making all attractive for our own enjoyment and the pleasure of our visitors." By doing this, he stressed, Bend will be joining in the general state beautification program of the Oregon roadside council.

Mayors of all cities and towns in Oregon have been asked to join with the council in observing March 23 to 29, inclusive, as cleanup week, and in this move Mayor Simpson said he was glad to cooperate.

Governor Charles A. Sprague recently endorsed the general state cleanup program and issued a proclamation setting a week aside for beautification work.

Fire Chief Tom W. Carlon today asked every home owner in Bend to join in the cleanup move, and, if possible, to assist in the clearing of debris from vacant lots. Firemen later will make a general inspection of the town.

The cleanup program will start Sunday, Carlon pointed out. No burning permits will be required during the week, but the chief asks that every precaution be taken with fires.
