

# AXIS HEADS TO SPLIT NATION

## Jugoslavia to Be Cut Into Parts

### New Croat State Planned; Hungary and Bulgaria To Get Share

Berlin, April 21 (AP)—Count Galeazzo Ciano, Italian foreign minister, has arrived in German territory to discuss with German leaders the future of Yugoslavia territory, it was said today in reliable quarters.

Earlier, nazis had made it known that King Boris of Bulgaria had visited Adolf Hitler Saturday at the Nazi fuhrer's field headquarters in the Balkans, and had returned to Sofia yesterday.

It was assumed that Boris had discussed the future of Yugoslav territory.

There have been reports of a conference, probably at Vienna, in which Yugoslavia would be carved up and divided among its neighbors, Hungary and Bulgaria already have occupied parts of it and a Croat separatist regime has been formed.

Nazis refused to say whom Ciano would meet or where meetings would be held.

It was assumed he would see Joachim von Ribbentrop, Nazi foreign minister, probably outside Berlin.

Well informed nazis said Ciano would discuss "the boundaries of the territory formerly covered by the Yugoslav state; and the political shape of the new Croat state."

They indicated that no general carving meeting was to be expected immediately, adding that the present discussions would be the first preliminaries toward such a conference.

The informants said they had heard no confirmation of reports that Hitler and Benito Mussolini would meet soon.

(There had been no previous suggestion of such a meeting.)

### Officials Visit to Make Arrangements

Here to make arrangements for the Oregon postmasters convention, June 26 to 28, Mrs. Winifred Wisecarver, McMinnville, vice president of the postmasters association and chairman of the convention program committee, and Mrs. Mae Humphrey, Boring, association secretary, arrived in Bend Saturday evening, conferred with R. H. Fox, Bend postmaster, and left for their homes Sunday afternoon.

Aside from highlights on convention plans, Mrs. Wisecarver left the information that there is no such thing, officially, as a postmistress. "Mrs. Humphrey and I are both postmasters," she emphasized. "U. S. postal regulations does not recognize the position of postmistress, and so it simply doesn't exist."

Mrs. Humphrey and Fox concurred. Business sessions, Mrs. Wisecarver announced, will be devoted entirely to matters relating to the postal service. Officials from Washington, D. C., are expected to attend and will have prominent places on the program.

The convention will not be all work, however, she insisted. There will be golf and fishing, there will be a bridge luncheon at Suttle lake lodge, and there will be two banquets, one on June 26 and one on June 27. The Pilot Butte Inn will be convention headquarters, with the dining room provided by the management for all business sessions.

"We should have a registration in the neighborhood of 300," Mrs. Wisecarver thought. Although membership in the association is in no way compulsory, all Oregon postmasters, whether of the first, second, third, or fourth class, belong to the organization, she said.

## New Prineville Mill To Begin Operations

Prineville, April 21 (Special)—It was announced this week that Paul B. Kelly, whose new sawmill in the Ochoco forest will be ready for operation in about four weeks, has purchased a tract of land just south of the Pine Products mill to use as a lumber yard. The tract purchased is adjacent to the site of the new Prineville Lumber company planing mill, on which construction began a few days ago.

The Kelly sawmill, about two miles east of Wildwood forest camp and about a mile from the Ochoco highway has been under construction since January. Kelly expects to have the plant in operation by the 15th of May. The mill will employ about 75 men and produce about 20 million feet of lumber a year.

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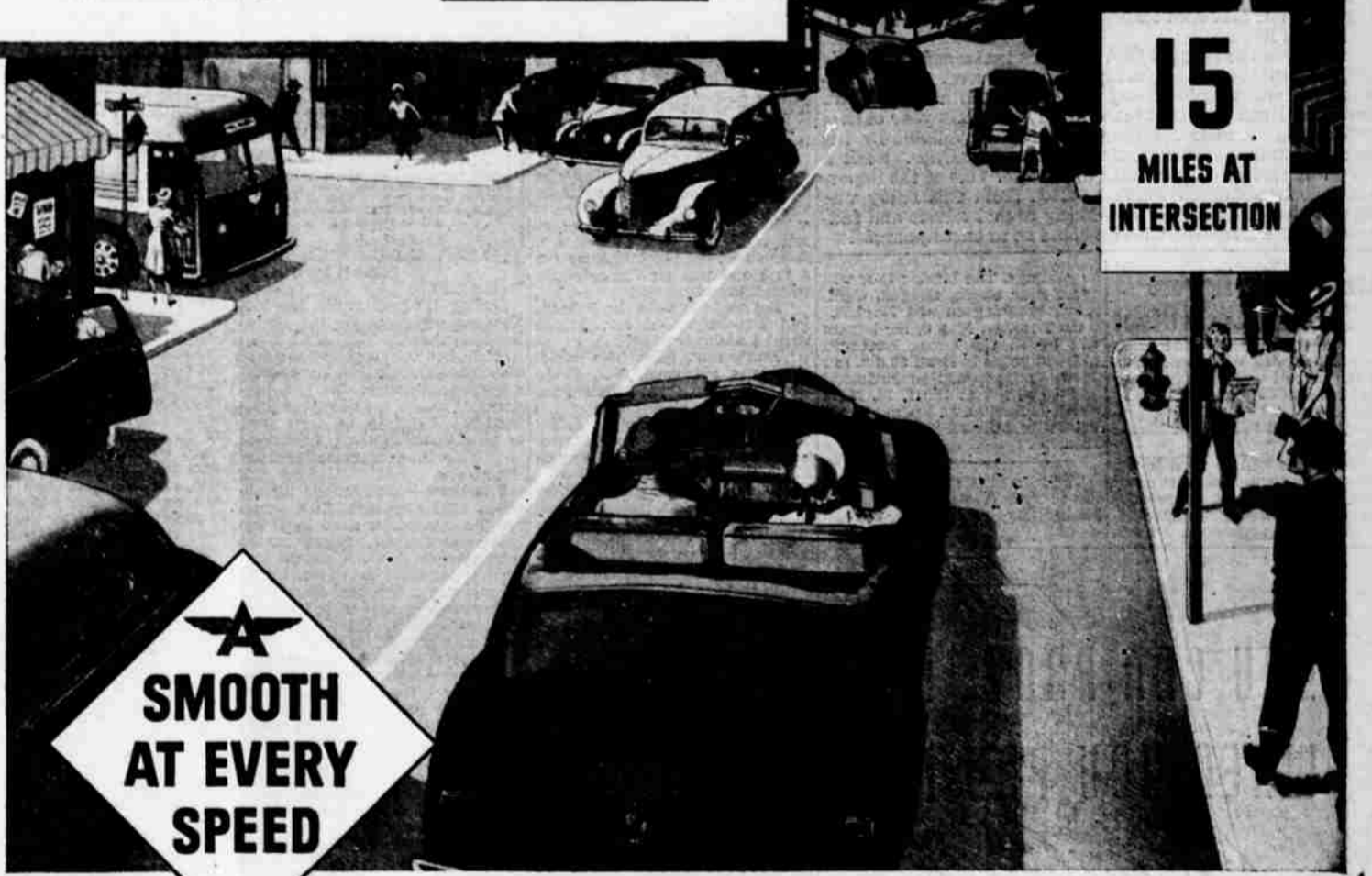
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
