

BUILDING PACE DECLINE SEEN

Permits for April Total
\$21,010

Residence Construction Forms Most of Local Activity

There was a marked drop in building permits granted in Bend this past month as compared with permits for April, 1940, data compiled by City Recorder George Simerville reveals. The April, 1941, permits aggregated \$21,010, compared with \$33,910. Not included in the city figures are new residences under construction just

outside the city limits. Although reconstruction of the Methodist church, recently damaged by fire, was started in April, the estimated cost of the work, \$7,200, will not show up in the city permits until the May figures are released. There is considerable building activity under way in Bend at present and it now appears that the May permits will be high. The largest building permit issued in April was for \$5,000, estimated minimum cost of a new residence to be erected by E. O. Stadter on Newport avenue, near the east approach to the Newport bridge. Preliminary work on this house is now under way. Other permits were issued to the following people: Joseph DeCarufel, residence on Riverside south of Tumalo; Luther Metke, residence at No. 8 Kansas; Hayden Price, residence at the corner of West Second and Saginaw; Wesley C. Garred, residence in Riverside addition; Ivan Wickens, residence on Heyburn

U. S. Marines Called After Shanghai Fray

Shanghai, May 13 (AP)—United States marines were called out to restore order today after a battle between international settlement police and pro-Japanese Chinese police in which an American and nine other persons were wounded. The fight started when settlement police halted an automobile containing Mrs. Ho Sze-Pao, wife of the chief of a special police branch office in the Shanghai "badlands," for a routine search as the car arrived at the barricade separating the "badlands" and the settlement. Jurisdiction over the "badlands" at the edge of the settlement is disputed and Chinese followers of Wang Ching Wei, head of the Japanese-sponsored Nanking regime, have set up a special police force to dominate the area.

Big Shipping Pool to Be Ready by Mid-June

Washington, May 13 (AP)—President Roosevelt's goal of 2,000,000 tons of emergency shipping for immediate service to Great Britain will be reached by mid-June, informed officials said today. Confidence that the shipping pool would be available at full strength within a month was expressed by officials who said it would include idle foreign ships to be taken over here, six new merchant ships scheduled for completion within 30 days and some cargo ships now engaged in international trade.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Henney, formerly of this district, are now at Port Angeles. The Henneys recently rented their ranch to Milo Wilmet.

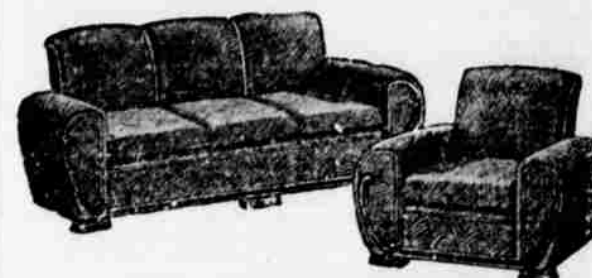
