Good Players Obtained By Southern Team

Bend Devoting Much Time To Batting Practice This Week

Bend's Oregon State league Elks, taking advantage of May sunshine, are engaging in stiff practice sessions this week, in preparation for the visit here Sunday of the Medford team, managed this season by Len Sauers, former Toledo head man. The Craters have pulled in a number of good players from Portland this season, and also have secured players from California.

In Bend, the Elks have had numerous opportunities of signing up outstanding players, but it has been impossible to line up any summer jobs here. Two players have been here for the past two weeks without a job. With only one game a week played, gate receipts make it impossible to help players, and members of the Elks team must make their summer living by working during the week. With the exception of the Elks, all state league teams are strengthening their squads and apparently having no difficulty in lining up work for their players.

Medford in its last state league game forced Albany, state champions, to play a 10 inning game to win from the Craters 3 to 2. Albany, fans predict, will again get the state title this year, but will face plenty of competition from Klamath Falls, Medford and Eugene. In fact, Albany may run into plenty of trouble before late summer, as other teams move into high gear.

Dodgers Continue on Nosedive

Cleveland Beaten Third Straight Time; Yanks Win

New York, May 21 (AP)—There was some evidence today to indicate that the world's champion Cincinnati Reds, who courted like something out of a circus sideshow during the first month of the season, finally have unwound themselves.

Scoring six runs in the ninth inning, the Reds overcame a three-run deficit yesterday to trim the Boston Braves, 9-6.

It was the Reds' third straight win. They've started to hit, which was the main thing wrong with them. They made 10 hits yesterday, 14 Monday and 11 Sunday.

The Dodgers' nosedive continued with their fourth straight loss, a 9-1 shelling by the Chicago Cubs. Lou Stringers, Cub rookie who took over Billy Herman's job, drove in four runs with a triple and single while Herman was helpless before Bill Lee's slants.

Pittsburgh moved into sixth place by defeating the Giants 7-5. Arky Vaughan's first homer of the season with a mate on base was the Pirates margin of victory.

The amazing Phillies spotted the league-leading Cardinals four runs and then came on to beat them, 6-4, in 11 innings.

Cleveland dropped its third straight to the Athletics, 6-5, and the Indians' American league lead melted to two games over the White Sox who trimmed Washington, 5-2.

Aided by six St. Louis errors the Yankees staggered to a 10-9 victory over the Browns and reached the 500 mark again.

Rookie Earl Johnson's four-hitter paced the Red Sox to a 4-2 win over the Tigers, snapping Boston's five-game losing streak. He blanked Detroit until the ninth when Ruby York homered with one on.

Sacramento stretched its lead to 7½ games in the Pacific Coast league last night by beating Los Angeles while second-place Seattle was losing to Oakland.

The Solons took a 7-5 verdict from Los Angeles, coming from behind with a six-run rally in the sixth.

Lou Tost replaced Frank Dasso in the second inning and pitched the rest of the game on three hits. Hollywood got 12 hits from Gonzales and Harrell.

San Francisco blanked San Diego, 9-0, clipping three Padre pitchers for 15 hits. Tom Seals, Seals southpaw, held San Diego to three hits and pitched no-hit ball for the first seven innings.

Ernie Kershaw pitched a two-hitter for the Vancouver Capilans Tuesday night, enabling the Caps to blank Salem 9-0 in a Western International league game.

Vancouver hammered two Solon pitchers for nine hits and made them all count, bunching six in the fourth inning.

Yakima staged a five-run rally in the fourth inning to upset the league-leading Spokane Indians 6-4. Yakima outhit the leaders 10 to 9.

Tacoma gathered 13 hits off Wenatchee, four of them home runs, but sank deeper in the cellar when the Chiefs edged out a 5-5 victory. The homers were evenly divided between Morry Abbott and Bill Gray.
