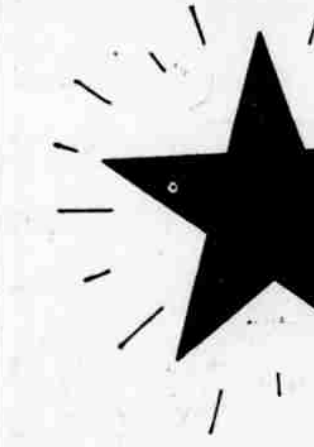

Road Near Redmond Airport to Be Changed

The county court today ordered relocation of the Powell Butte market road, so that the road will run around the Redmond airport project instead of through it. As originally built, the road cut one of the proposed runways, and officials feared that work on the project would be delayed if the road were not re-aligned. The petition for relocation has been posted for the past 30 days, explained County Judge C. L. Allen, and today would have been the day for any hearing on the matter, had there been objections.

Through Ross Farnham, the Bend Sand and Gravel company applied for the purchase of sand and gravel from the county court, but the request was temporarily denied, since county road-building activities demand the present supply of grading materials.

Other court business consisted of approving bills for the past two weeks.
