

# Cincinnati Reds Gear Themselves For Pennant Try

### Derringer Hurls Team To 1-0 Shutout Over Braves; Giants Win

New York, June 13 (UP)—The Cincinnati Reds are making a last-minute attempt to gear themselves for a bitter pennant battle in the National league.

Ordered by Commissioner Kene-saw Landis to bring Pitcher Johnny Hutchings back from the minors, the Reds kept him for only a few hours and then traded him to the Boston Braves for Outfielder Lloyd Waner in a straight player-for-player swap. The deal once again broke up the Waner brothers combination, recently reunited when the Braves signed Paul as a free agent.

As an upshot of the deal several other clubs may try to patch up weak spots before the major league trading deadline Sunday midnight.

**Derringer Is Star**

Two brilliantly pitched games featured yesterday's National league play. Big Paul Derringer hurled the Reds to a 1-0 shutout over the Braves, beating Art Johnson, rookie southpaw. Derringer yielded four hits and fanned six in winning his sixth game.

King Carl Hubbell notched his fourth victory by pitching the Giants to a 2-0 victory over the Cubs. Hubbell allowed eight hits to Bill Lee's six but pitched his way of several tight spots.

After losing seven straight to Detroit this season, the Athletics staged a ninth inning rally to beat the Tigers, 5-3. The victory also broke the A's six-game losing streak. With two on base, two out in the ninth and the Tigers leading, 3-2, Al Benton relieved Johnny Goreisa and tossed a home run ball to Al Banton.

**Red Sox Victors**

The Red Sox nosed out the Browns, 3-2, on Ted Williams' 11th homer with a mate on base, to gain an even break with St. Louis, which won the opener, 3-4.

Joe DiMaggio closed his 12th homer of the year in the 10th inning last night to give the Yankees a disputed 3-2 triumph over the White Sox before a throng of 37,102 at Comiskey park.

Ruffing's pinch-hit fly to the left center field scoreboard after Gordon singled scored the Sox to protest the game. Chicago claimed a fan touched the ball thus creating an automatic double which would have stopped Gordon at third and perhaps prevented the Yankees from tying the score in the ninth.

Champion Joe reached his peak too soon for this bout. Every one in camp admits that.

Now the big problem is to maintain the razor edge he flashed on Tuesday, an edge that came five days before it should.

Hence we find Louis coasting through a mere four rounds of sparring daily in Joe Murchio's indoor gym instead of tearing through six or eight, as one would expect as the day of battle nears.

Apparently the champion is to blame, because Jack Blackburn, one of the smartest trainers in the game, tried to put the brakes on Bomber Joe long before Tuesday. But the Detroit negro insisted upon working harder for this brawl with the Pittsburgh will-o'-the-wisp than for any previous engagement.

## Seals Again Win From Rainiers

The band of alleged cripples parading under the San Francisco banner walked Seattle's Rainiers for the third straight time last night and did it by a 16 to 1 count, which may be par for William Jennings Bryan but not for the Rainiers.

Tom Seals turned in his eighth victory of the season in limiting the former league-leaders to five hits while Dick Barrett was chased to cover with a six-run barrage in the first inning and Dewey Soriano was equally ineffective. Five hits, two walks and an error by Earl Averill with the bases loaded that permitted three runs to score, accounted for the six run splurge.

Sacramento, too, continued its winning ways, taking their third straight from Hollywood, 8 to 1, and their sixth consecutive win.

Although Herman Reich got his third homer in as many days—with the bases loaded, too—Los Angeles came from behind to defeat Portland 12 to 11 in 10 innings. Reich's homer climaxed a rally that netted the Beavers seven runs on six hits in the fourth inning and game them a temporary 9 to 0 lead.

The Seraphs got wise to Ad Liska in the fifth and he was succeeded by Reid, Orrell, Speece and Hiler in turn before Lee Stine, the third Angel twirler, opened the 10th with a single, advanced on Peanut Lowrey's bunt and came home when Hiler threw the ball into center field trying to nail Stine off base. Eddie Mayo homered for the Angels with two on in the sixth. Portland leads the series, two games to one.

San Diego took its third in a row from Oakland, 4 to 0, marking up the seventh straight win for the Padres.
