

Profit Taking Causes Reaction On Eastern Mart

Early Selling Feels Effect of Nazi Threat To Sink More Vessels

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

Stocks lower in quiet trading. Bonds irregularly lower. Curb stocks irregular. Wheat up 1/4-1/2 cents; corn up 1/2-1/4 cents. Cotton up as much as 65 cents a bale. Rubber easier. Silver in New York unchanged.

New York, June 13 (U.P.)—The stock market reacted today on profit-taking and then rallied from the lows to close irregular. Trading fell below the recent pace.

Early selling was influenced in part by the German threat to sink all ships carrying contraband. The recovery was aided by reports that British planes torpedoed a German pocket battleship off Norway. Trading improved in volume on the recovery.

Dun and Bradstreet reported retail trade this week 15 to 18 per cent above a year ago and stated the total was one of the best for any corresponding week since 1929.

Automobile shares were soft and rallied only moderately. Offsetting a rise in auto output was a request by Price Administrator Henderson that companies which recently raised prices of automobiles withdraw the advances. These companies are Ford, Chrysler, Nash-Kelvinator, Studebaker and Hudson.

Chrysler at its low of 57 was off 1 1/2 and general Motors touched 38 1/2 off 1/2. Aircraft shares were slightly easier.

Oils were firm, featured by standard oil (New Jersey) which made a new high at 39 1/2 up 1/2. Phillips Petroleum made a new top at 43 1/2 up 1/2.

BOSTON WOOL
Boston, June 13 (U.P.)—Worsted types of greasy shorn domestic wools were slow but some houses were receiving a fair demand for woolen types of domestic wools today, according to the U. S. agriculture department.
A few sales were of fair volume on eight-month Texas wools, pulled domestic wools, and a few types of scoured foreign wools. Short to good French combings fine territory original wools quoted at \$1 to \$1.63 scoured basis were very slow. Average bright combing 5 and 4 blood fleece wools were quiet and quotations were showing some softness as an occasional carload was available at prices slightly under the range 46 to 47 cents in the grease.

REA North Unit Receives Energy

Redmond, June 13 (U.P.)—Energization of the north unit of the Central Oregon REA project was proceeding Thursday, bringing electric power and light to the well populated farming districts of north Redmond, Terrebonne, Lone Pine, and the northern part of the Powell Butte community. Morgan Sharp, REA superintendent, said that 65 members in this section have farms wired and ready to receive service, and that these will be hooked up by line crews at the rate of about 15 a day.

The west unit is now 100 per cent energized, Sharp said, except for a few farms where wiring jobs have not been completed and inspected. In all, 77 farms are now receiving service on this unit, first in the project to get electricity.

The third unit of the big project includes territory in the Alfalfa, Eastern Star, and south Powell Butte communities, and is practically ready for energization as far as construction of lines is concerned, but Sharp said much wiring remained to be done there. A wiring inspector is due in Redmond today, and has many applications waiting for his approval.

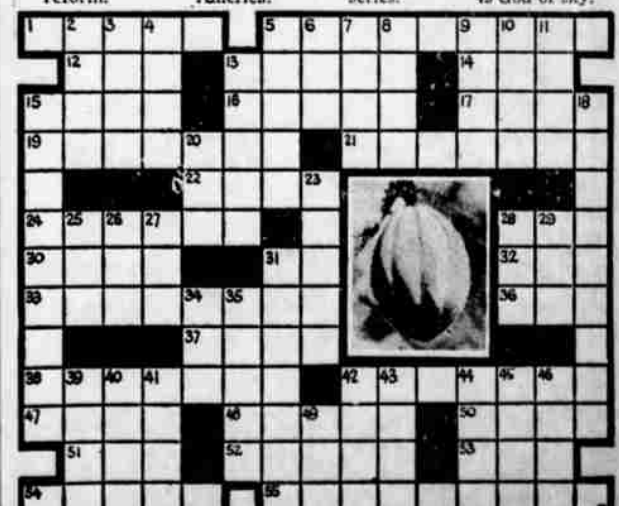
