Mrs. Henry B. Colver and son, Jay, returned yesterday from a two weeks trip to Salt Lake City,

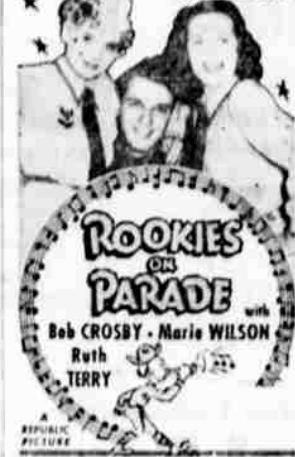

Portland, June 13 (AP)—Oregon state amateur golf play developed into an almost local affair in the semi-finals today.

Only "outsider" in the bracket was Alan Mills of San Francisco, who was pitted against Bob Brinson of Peninsula. Mills, former Portland runner-up in the 1936 tournament, beat Jack Shuler of Waverly 4 and 3. Brinson accomplished the day's major upset in dropping Dr. O. F. Willing, four times champion, one up on the 19th.

In the other pair were Louis Jennings of Portland, who beat Ed Watson of Riverside 2 and 1, and Roy Wiggins, 1936 state champion, who trounced Glen Scharback of Oregon City by the same margin.

In women's play, Babe Fresse went to the semi's with a 2 up win over Mrs. William Roblin of Hood River, and bumped into Sissy Green of Waverly, who had triumphed over Mrs. Martin Hunter, 6 and 5.

Mrs. Margaret Crosbie of Alderwood met Mrs. Omar Anderson of the same club after beating Dorothy McBride of Waverly 7 and 5.

Mrs. Anderson won from Mrs. Mac Wilkins of Portland 3 and 1.

In the men's first flight Jim Johnson of Eugene met Mat Palacio of San Francisco. Johnson beat Milt Campbell 3 and 1.

In the second flight, Earl Fortmiller, Eugene, opposes Glen Spivey of The Dalles. Fortmiller arrived by a 3 and 1 win over Chuck Stafford 6 and 5.

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## Nazi-Soviet Break Rumors Still Leak From Over Ocean

## London Reports New Announcement to Be Made in Near Future

London, June 13 (AP)—A report from Finland that an important statement on German-Finnish relations was imminent, and reports from Rumania that air raid precautions suddenly had been intensified, stirred interest today in the multiplying indications that Germany might be preparing to strike at Russia.

A United Press Helsinki dispatch said that the statement on German-Finnish relations was expected today.

A United Press Bucharest bureau reported that authorities had ordered a thorough inspection of all Bucharest buildings before Sunday to determine their resistance to aerial bombs, and that newspapers published long articles instructing the public on measures to take for their own protection in event of air raids. Householders were advised that trenches were better shelter than cellars. They pointed out the lessons to be learned from the recent "catastrophe" to another Balkan capital, Belgrade.

The newspapers said Germany had three picked divisions or about 45,000 men, in Finland now and that German transports were moving into the Gulf of Bothnia between Finland and Sweden.

New York, June 13 (AP)—A broadcast by the official Russian news agency Tass heard in New York today said that rumors of German troop concentrations on the Russian border and Nazi demands on the soviet are "clumsily concocted propaganda of forces hostile to the U. S. S. R. and Germany."

GERMANS IN FINLAND

Berlin, June 13 (AP)—A German spokesman said tonight that "it is well known that German troops are at present in Finland" but declined any comment on British reports that 55,000 Nazi troops recently arrived there.

The spokesman said that "nothing is known here" of any basis for reports that German troops have gone to Finland in a precautionary move against Russia.

"Even if we knew anything," the spokesman said, "we would be unable to say anything as this is a military matter."

OLD PRISONER DIES

Salem, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Homer Yeats, 68, one of the oldest inmates of the state penitentiary, died in the prison hospital last night, apparently of a heart attack.

Yeats was committed on November 8, 1913, to serve a life term for murder. He was committed from Salem.
