

Elks, Silverton To Meet in Bend In Featured Game

Four Teams at Present Tied for Leadership Of State Ball League

Two of the four teams now tied for the leadership of the Oregon State Baseball League meet here tomorrow when Silverton and Bend cross bats, and before June shadows cross the local diamond Sunday afternoon fans may see either the Elks or the Sox alone on top of the heap. Albany and Klamath Falls are the other two teams at present tied for league honors.

Albany will play Toledo tomorrow and Klamath Falls will play at Hills Creek. Eugene will entertain Medford.

The Bend-Silverton game, one of the highlighted affairs of the week end, will start at the usual time, 2:30 p. m.

Silverton Is Strong
Not only will Bend be facing a powerful team tomorrow, but the local nine will be considerably weakened by the loss of Wally Graser, who recently left for Washington. Manager Clyde Stokoe reported today that his starting lineup will not be known until game time. On "paper," Bend and Silverton early this week appeared of about equal strength, but the loss of Graser has changed the outlook. Bend defeated Albany last Sunday 9 to 2 and on Tuesday night Silverton defeated the Alcos 6 to 0.

Bend also will face Silverton tomorrow handicapped by the lack of practice. Attendance at workouts this week has been very poor and some of the players have not touched a glove since last Sunday. Work was partly responsible. Inclement weather was also a factor. Bill Hatch, ace hurler for the Elks, has not been able to join in a practice this week.

Toolson May Start
It is expected that Silverton will send its ace pitcher, Toolson, to the mound against the Elks, with McClain, star Jefferson high hurler, and Jack Richards, Willamette university southpaw, in reserve. Robertson, last year's catcher for the championship Albany team, will do the catching for Silverton tomorrow.

Occupying the bases and holding down the outfield berths for Silverton will be a team just as powerful as the squads that represented the west side town in national tournaments in past years. For the Elks, Hatch will get the call to start on the mound against the Sox and Kremers will be behind the bat. The infield will be picked from John Bubbalo, Murel Nehl, Bob Douglas, Joe Volk and Jack Gordon. Outfielders will be chosen from the squad composed of Harold Ogden, Tom Hawkins, George Walker and Bill Mayer.

Wenatchee Team Blanked by Tigers

The Wenatchee Chiefs, cellar occupants of the Western International league, suffered through a bleak evening's play in a double-header with the Tacoma Tigers last night. The Tigers were merciless, allowing Wenatchee two goose-eggs by winning 9-0 and 3-0. Salem was another shutout victim, losing 7-0 to the Vancouver Capitanos. Cy Greenlaw yielded seven hits to the Senators, while 13 bingles rolled off the heavy bats of the Canadians.

Spokane regained its league leadership with a 3-10 victory over second-place Yakima in a hot 10-inning contest. A three-run burst in the final stanza saved the game for the Indians, who out-hit Yakima 17-10.

Oakland's Acorns, up and down like a stock market chart, won their third game in four starts last night from Sacramento's Cardinals, but it took 13 innings and an error to turn the trick, 3 to 2.

Shortstop Gene Handley booted Cecil Dunn's hard grounder and permitted Mike Christoff to score the deciding run. Handley's sixth inning error also permitted Mel Deuzabou to score another unearned run.

Hollywood and San Diego, too, put on a 13-inning game, and the Padres won it 4 to 3 in an identical manner—Manager Bill Sweeney of the Stars let Pinch Hitter Bill Salkeld's hit get away from him while Haslin scored. Sweeney provided the Stars with their first run in the second by homering.

Los Angeles landed on Sylvester Johnson in the sixth inning to score all their runs and a 3 to 1 win over Seattle, their first victory of the series. Seattle held a 1 to 0 lead until the sixth when Rabbit Warstler's line drive struck Johnson on the foot. Yanks' Home Run Machinery Ready For New Record

Indians' Lead Lowered To Two Games as Archie Gets Required Score

New York, June 21 (AP)—The Yankee home run machinery was polished and oiled today to go after another record.

The Yanks have hit 27 homers in 16 straight games and already have surpassed the major league record set by the Tigers in 17 consecutive games last year.

But the McCarthy men need at least one circuit clout in today's game against the Detroit Tigers at Yankee stadium to match the Tigers' consecutive game total for hitting homers.

Homers Pounded Out
With Henrich and Keller hitting first inning homers and DiMaggio belting out four straight hits to make it seven in a row, the Yanks trounced the Tigers, 14-4, and gained a game on the league-leading Indians.

Marius Russo, Yankee southpaw, who had lost four in a row, won his first game since May 7. Buck Newsom, Tiger ace, was knocked out of the box for the 13th time in 15 starts and suffered his ninth defeat.

Cleveland's lead was trimmed to two games when Washington beat the Tribe in the ninth, 7-6. After the Indians had scored three to tie the score, George Archie singled, stole second and scored on Buddy Lewis' single with two out to win for Washington.

The Red Sox moved within 3 1/2 games of the top, defeating the Browns, 4-2. Eldon Auker held Boston to two hits until the sixth when they scored three runs.

In the National league, the St. Louis Cardinals' lead shrank to two games over the Brooklyn Dodgers when they dropped a 6-2 night game to the New York Giants. Bob Carpenter notched his fourth victory, limiting the Cards to six hits.

Hugh Casey pitched a three-hitter and Brooklyn took a 6-2 triumph over the Reds. Bucky Walters suffered his sixth and most decisive setback of the season.

Larry French allowed only four hits and didn't permit a runner to reach second until two were out in the ninth and the Cubs blanked the Braves, 5-0. Babe Dahlgren hit his third homer for the Cubs in two days.

Frank Gustine's single with the bases loaded in the ninth gave the Pirates a 7-4 victory over the Phillies. Deb Garms' triple with two on featured the Pirates' four-run rally which tied the score in the seventh.

Lou Nova Signs To Battle Louis

New York, June 21 (AP)—Lou Nova of California signed a contract today to fight Joe Louis for the heavyweight championship in September.

Promoter Mike Jacobs said that the date and site would be announced soon. Ray Carlen, Nova's manager, said Lou would leave in a few days for the Maine woods where he will spend several weeks getting into condition.
