The Eagles won't go hungry at their annual state wide convention, which will be held in Bend on June 26, 27 and 28. Huge quantities of food for the free lunches have been ordered, according to W. J. Baer, general chairman for the event, including 700 pounds of cheese, a barrel of dill pickles, 12 cases of sandwich spread, six cases of mayonnaise and 25 gallons of mustard. There will be about 300 loaves of bread consumed each day, Baer said.

Nearly 1500 people are expected to come to Bend for the convention, according to Baer. Music for marching will be provided by 8 to 10 drum and bugle corps, which will march in the parade, and hold their annual competition afterward.

The Eagles "nest", which will be located in the Hippodrome, will be open in the evenings for Eagles and their wives, with entertainment, music and a floor show. The free sandwich lunches will be served there.
