War In Brief

London—RAF resumes blitz of offensive against Germany and Nazi occupied Europe; huge night attacks on Cologne, Rotterdam and new German coastal defenses in France; non-stop daylight attacks on northern France start at dawn; new minister of information is named in cabinet shakeup.

Moscow—A communique indicates little Nazi progress in past 24 hours; guerrilla war said to be intensified behind German lines; Josef Stalin assumes defense commissariat; Moscow has 40 minute air alarm.

Berlin—Claim six Russian divisions smashed, including one in Mogilev area, 80 miles southwest of Smolensk; the high command claims more soviet forces are encircled and face annihilation.

Rome—Fifteen persons killed, 24 wounded in British attack on Naples; blackout hours extended.

Tokyo—Japanese press claims United States can't move fleet to Atlantic to aid Britain due to uncertainty over Japanese plans, Japan urged to rely on self rather than axis or Russian pacts.

Origin of the fire was unknown. Captain C. C. Light and members of his crew lost all of their personal effects.

Portland, July 21 (AP)—Death was the umpire who called Paddy Kreitz "out" yesterday during a baseball game at the Old-Timers' Baseball association at Blue Lake park.

Ralph Wesley Kreitz, 55, known as "Red" and "Paddy," hit a single in an exhibition game and was running toward first base when he clutched his side and collapsed. He died half an hour later.

Kreitz, a resident of Hillsboro, caught for the Chicago White Sox of the American league from 1910 to 1912. He is survived by a widow and daughter.
