

New York Takes Pair of Victories From Dodgers

St. Louis Cards Move One and a Half Games Ahead in National

New York, Aug. 13 (AP)—The New York Giants have suffered one of the most uninspiring seasons in the club's colorful history but that was forgotten today for two very good reasons—a pair of victories over the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Loaded down with more veterans than any club in the major leagues, the Giants have staggered into the National league's second division and face a long, detailed rebuilding before they can improve their status. Their only marked success has been over the fabled, last-place Philadelphia Phillies who have lost nine games to the Giants while winning only three.

But something happens when the Giants and Dodgers meet, some spark is set off that puts both clubs on their mettle. At Ebbets field yesterday the park touched off an explosion that gave the Giants twin wins, 8-5, and 2-0, and blew the Dodgers out of first place.

Mel Ott clouted his 20th and 21st home runs of the year, each with two men on base, leading a 10-hit Giant attack on five pitchers in the first game. He drove in six runs and scored two. Carl Hubbell scattered 11 Brooklyn hits for his 10th victory.

Cliff Melton, ineffective for most of the season, completed the Brooklyn rout in the nightcap by holding the Dodgers to three hits. The St. Louis Cardinals went 1 1/2 games ahead of Brooklyn by staging an uphill battle to defeat the Chicago Cubs, 8-7. Creepy Crespi cracked out three singles and a double for the Cards.

Mickey Livingston's 13th inning double gave the Phils a 2-1 decision over the Boston Braves. Jim Tobin held the Phils until the 13th when Merrill May's single, a sacrifice and Livingston's blow ended the battle.

The New York Yankees, after going scoreless for 37 straight innings in the stadium, blanked the Boston Red Sox, 4-0 behind Spud Chandler's six-hit pitching.

Al Benton, former relief pitcher, gave up four hits and outpitched Bobby Feller to bring Detroit a 2-0 victory over the Indians in the first game but Cleveland snapped their losing streak at six games with a 4-1 victory in the nightcap. Feller fanned seven to bring his season total to 205, making it the fourth consecutive year he has gone over 200.

Washington clipped Philadelphia 9-3, Dutch Leonard winning his seventh straight and 13th of the season.

The Chicago White Sox and St. Louis Browns tied 6-6 over 14 innings. The game was called because of darkness after each club had used three pitchers.

Spokane, Yakima Divide Twin Bill

Spokane and Yakima, the two top clubs in the Western International league, split a double-header at Yakima last night, with Spokane winning the abbreviated opener 7-5 and Yakima taking a 12-inning nightcap, 8-7.

The Wenatchee Chiefs scored a close 6-5 victory over the Tacoma Tigers with a three-run rally in a wild ninth inning.

Freitas Defeats Seals Once More

Sacramento's southpaw Tony Freitas, who has been beating San Francisco for years, did his trick again last night as the Pacific Coast league leaders trimmed the Seals 4-2.

Freitas, whose presence in Seal stadium always means a sad night in the Mission district, spotted San Francisco a run in the first inning last night, but his colleagues got four for him in the second inning and he was never in trouble. Freitas scattered seven Seal hits while Larry Jansen allowed the Solons 12.

Second-place San Diego kept pace with the Solons by edging out Los Angeles, 6-5, in 10 innings. Although Jess Flores gave the Padres only six hits, four of them bounced back at him for home runs and two of them occurred with a man on base to account for all the San Diego scoring.

The Padres stayed 8 1/2 games behind Sacramento. Third-place Seattle split a double-header with Hollywood. The Stars won the first game, 9-6, pouncing on Turpin and Brown for 16 hits. Gay and Weidon worked for the winners, giving 13 hits, and Hollywood booted four errors. Seattle squared it in the nightcap, 4-3, coming from behind in the final inning with a pair of runs.

Catcher Bob Collins singled Jo Jo White home with the deciding run, ending a pitching duel between Syl Johnson of Seattle and Frank Rasso of Hollywood, each of them yielding six hits.

Portland beat Oakland, 10-4. Although the Acorns did most of the hitting they had five errors in the clutches. Tom Ananicz was driven from the mound in the seventh after giving Portland an 8-4 lead. Frankie Hawkins had a homer for Portland. Earl Reid managed to win although he allowed Oakland 13 hits.

Bobby Litton Is State Golf Champ

Gearhart, Aug. 13 (AP)—Little Bobby Litton, Portland professional golfer, today was Oregon state champion and \$300 richer. Litton took first place and top money in the 72-hole \$1,000 Oregon open golf tournament yesterday with a 16 under par 272.

He had a 69-68 in the final rounds. Second was Ted Longworth, Portland, with 276. Emery Zimmerman, Portland, and Chuck Congdon, Tacoma, tied for third with 277.

Harold West, Longview, Wash., came fourth with 282 and trailing in fifth place was Al Zimmerman, the new Pacific northwest champion, with 283. Zimmerman started the day with 133, two strokes ahead of the field, but couldn't keep pace with Litton's sub-par shooting.

Dick Hanen, Marshfield, was tied with Don Thompson, Portland, for amateur honors with 284. Hanen nosed out Thompson by one point on the playoff.
