Fair Committees Start Work on 1941 Show Plans

Sub-Chairman Named To Handle Different Departments of Work

Redmond, Aug. 13.—The Deschutes county fair board, meeting in Redmond Monday night, plunged briskly into the multitude of plans and preparations which will fill the six weeks remaining before the gates swing open on Friday, September 26, for the three days of the 1941 fair.

Chairman M. A. Lynch appointed sub-chairman who will supervise the different departments of the fair. R. J. Carpenter will have charge of finances, Howard Mayfield will again manage the rodeo, and M. A. Canning will supervise the races. Agricultural exhibits will again be the responsibility of W. F. Hardison, while the parade and queen contest will be in charge of Dr. H. W. Rogers. Assistants in each division will be named later.

Every effort is to be made this year to have the biggest and best parade yet staged, says Rogers. It is anticipated that the national defense theme will be strongly evident, and for prizes this year, instead of the usual cups, the committee will offer \$15, \$10, and \$5 in defense savings stamps. Chairman Lynch is already issuing the call for riders for the parade, and would like to see at least a hundred horsemen and horsewomen take part.

"We have beautiful horses and fine riders in this county," says Lynch, "and this is the opportunity to display them."

The premium list is now being printed and the 1941 books will be off the press this week. Because of the fine crops this year, and good condition of livestock, it is believed that this year's exhibits will exceed the high standards previously set.

Arrangements for the rodeo stock will be complete in a few days, Lynch said.

Prices for the 1941 show were not definitely decided Monday night, but the 25 cent general admission is to be used again this year. In general, the show will cost fair-goers about the same as last year, directors said.

Classes Prove Popular In Flower Arranging

Boston (AP)—On the premise that city dwellers can find in flowers relaxation and pleasure, Boston horticulturalists are conducting flower-arranging classes for housewives.

Classes meet once a week under the direction of Mrs. Arthur P. Teele. Students bring only a pair of scissors, a flower holder and 50 cents. The horticultural society, which sponsors the course, provides a variety of flowers.

Mrs. Teele says the trick in arranging flowers is to create an effect of casualness. In achieving this effect, students make fan displays, right-angle arrangements and unusual line groups.

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
