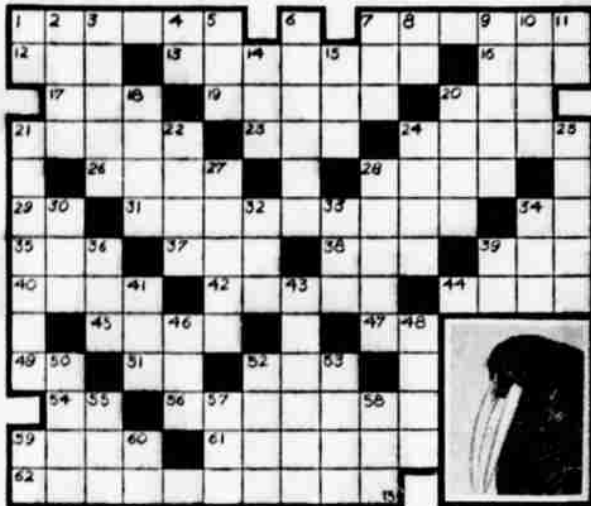

Three Ordinances Pass at Remond

Redmond, Aug. 13—Three ordinances were passed by the Redmond city council Tuesday night, providing for a revised building code, increased fire protection in the downtown fire zone, and putting into effect a 10 o'clock curfew regulation.

The new building code, which replaces all building regulations previously in operation, includes a revised schedule of fees for building permits. Fees will start at \$5.00 for the first \$1,000 or less of construction; with additional charges of \$2.00 per \$1,000 up to \$20,000; and \$1.00 per \$1,000 for amounts in excess of that figure.

Permits will be required for any construction or alteration over \$50.00. Provisions are made for more rigid inspection of all new construction, and employment of a building inspector.

New ordinances also provide for enlargement of the downtown fire zone, and periodic checks of possible fire hazards. Provisions as to types of wiring, plumbing, and other phases of new construction are revised and brought up to date.

The curfew ordinance provides that no person under 16 years of age may be on the public streets at night between the hours of 10 p. m. and 4 a. m., unless accompanied by parents or guardian. This provision is to be enforced by reprimand for the first offense, with fines varying from \$5 to \$25 for repeated infractions.

The council voted to instruct Engineer Thomas Smithson to check plans for ornamental lighting on E street from the alley between Seventh and Eighth streets to Fourth street. Lights are to be installed under provisions of the Bancroft act.

Officers of the IX army corps, charged with defense of the northwest, received these rapid-fire reports of the "enemy's" successful advance:

McChord field near Tacoma destroyed by bombs which blew up all runways and half the base's planes before they could take off. Aberdeen and Raymond invaded by parachute troops and transports.

North Head and Camp Clatsop taken by parachutists. One hundred thousand troops prepared to defend the northwest from Fort Lewis.

Although no army units will start moving until next Saturday, problem director created a realistic setting of the invasion picture by day-to-day "communiques" which outlined the defense problems to be solved by the maneuvers.

A "coalition of navy powers" was assumed to have captured Hawaii and concentrated an invasion force there. The problem specified that had visibility off the coast made aerial reconnaissance impossible, leaving the entire coast of California, Oregon and Washington to surprise attack.

All army and harbor defense units on the coast were on a maneuver alert basis to repel an attack at any point.

"Communiques" said the first attack came Monday at Grays Harbor, Wash., and was repulsed. Monday night the enemy theoretically struck at Monterey, Cal., and shelled the city. Civilian survivors were "evacuated" in private automobiles, directed by the army and county defense council. The strong defenses of Monterey Presidio and Fort Ord were assumed to have withstood that attack, and reconnaissance planes were reported to have sighted naval units moving towards southern California.
