

College Entrance Not to Result In Deferments

Students Preparing for Defense Occupations Placed in Class II

Salem, Aug. 21 (AP)—Selective service registrants who have not been given a deferred classification and who are enrolling at colleges this fall need not expect to receive deferment merely on the basis of their student status. Lt. Colonel Elmer V. Wooten, state director of selective service, said today.

Colonel Wooten said it was not his intention to discourage selective service registrants from enrolling in the various colleges and universities, but that he felt it necessary that they be advised that as of July 1, 1941, the provision for deferment of college students to the end of the school year ceased to exist.

"Some college students have already been deferred to class II because they are preparing themselves for some specialized occupation such as engineering or aeronautical designing, and this

deferment will continue so long as they make satisfactory progress toward that goal," Colonel Wooten said.

"Such deferment will not be given, however, to students of courses which prepare them for occupations not considered vital to the national defense and in which there is no shortage of qualified men."

He suggested that college students who enrolled before their order numbers were reached might be given a stay of induction until the end of the school term or semester, but not longer. During the school year which ended last June, college students were automatically deferred until the end of the school year or not later than July 1, 1941, but this provision for deferment does not extend to the school year beginning next month.

Thunder Storms Start Three Fires

Three forest fires, all described as "small" by forest service officials today, were started by Wednesday storms, but were reported out this morning.

One of them was reported on Weasel butte, southeast of East Lake; another on the south slope of Pine mountain; and the third northeast of Bunny butte in the Crescent district.

Rumanian Oil Fields Damaged By Russian Raids

Railroads and Pipe Lines Struck in Bomb Attacks; Reds Hit Fake City

Istanbul, Turkey, Aug. 21 (AP)—Russian air raids on Rumanian oil fields and pipe lines have caused tremendous damage and loss of petroleum products, arrivals here today from the much-bombed Rumanian oil port of Constanta reported.

Travelers said that during a recent Russian bombardment of the Cornavoda bridge, about halfway between Constanta and Bucharest, important pipe lines were hit in two places, causing fires which blazed for hours.

Bursting bombs twisted steel rails into scrap iron, the arrivals said.

The bombardment of the Cornavoda bridge, the only railroad bridge over the Danube below Belgrade, and of the pipe line which crossed it, was reported to have cut off a huge supply of aviation gasoline needed by Germany for the campaign against Russia.

Great damage was said to have been done to oil supplies in Constanta itself. When the Russo-German war broke out, travelers said, every oil reservoir in Constanta was filled to overflowing with petroleum products for export to Russia and Turkey.

Getting out of Constanta what oil was not destroyed in bombardment of the port was said to have been made impossible by the cutting of the Cornavoda bridge.

Travelers said that the great Rumanian Ploesti oil fields north of Bucharest, which also have been bombed, have been drained of their gasoline reserves. As soon as it was said, supplies were rushed from Ploesti to Germany and the eastern front. Since then the Russians have subjected the fields to heavy aerial attacks.

It was said, however, that considering the magnitude of the Russian air attacks the Ploesti oil fields did not suffer too badly. It was reported that a duplicate city of Ploesti had been built some 15 miles north of the real Ploesti. For weeks, it was claimed, the Russians bombed the fake Ploesti and only recently discovered their mistake.

Teachers Find Shortage Of Japanese Linguists

Ithaca, N. Y. (AP)—Wanted: Japanese linguists in the United States.

That's the conclusion of a conference of teachers of the language who met at Cornell university. The gathering attracted 20 persons, among them 10 educators representing eight colleges and universities, and six government officials.

A dearth of persons speaking Japanese exists in the country, the group decided. The situation, the meeting agreed, presented opportunities for students, not only because of the Far Eastern crisis, but from the long-term need of business houses and government agencies.

Salem Votes for Airport Bonds

Salem, Aug. 21 (AP)—Further improvement of Salem's municipal airport was assured today after voters almost overwhelmingly balloted in favor of the \$75,000 city bond issue.

Passage of the amendment gives the city council authority to issue and sell serial bonds bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 4 1/2 per cent per annum and to provide for the levy of a special tax to pay the principal and interest.

The money will be expended to purchase land adjacent to the already enlarged airport and for the construction of new buildings. Slightly less than 16 per cent of the registered voters cast ballots in the election yesterday.

Girl, 8, Saves Home, Loses Doll in Fire

CROATIA RESISTS

Stockholm, Aug. 21 (AP)—The newspaper Aftonbladet reported from Berlin today that, according to private sources, Italian troops were attempting to occupy Croatia and were meeting Croat resistance.

London - Russia reported to have blown up big Dnieper river dam on orders from Stalin; Elliot Roosevelt sees increased complacency in U. S. and British since Russian entry into war; President Roosevelt reported to have approved whatever Anglo-Russian action necessary in Iran.

Berlin - Germans claim Russians fail to blow up big Dnieper dam, but admit several smaller dams blown up; high command claims capture of Novgorod, Narva and Kinkisepp on Leningrad front and Kherson on Dnieper.

Moscow - Russians claim destruction of crack German infantry division in Ukraine; Coroshinof calls on residents of Leningrad to defend city to death; communique reports fierce fighting at Gornel, Novgorod and Odessa.

Hess died suddenly of a heart attack in a Bend hospital. He was employed by the American Credit association and was on a business trip when stricken.

He served as sheriff of an Iowa county for 10 years before coming to Portland in 1932.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Mac Edwards, Portland, and Mrs. Vernon Downing, Oklahoma City; and one son, Robert H. Hess, Portland.
