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White Sox Stage Big Drive in American League

Streak Extended to Nine Straight; Cards Pick Up Half a Game

New York, Aug. 21 (AP)—Chasing the Yankees in a runaway race is an old American league pastime but the Chicago White Sox promise to add some new frills to it if they can maintain their magnificent pitching down the September stretch.

Although they are 15 games behind, the White Sox are playing as though they were right in the thick of the pennant scrap. They've won nine straight and 16 out of their last 19 games with one tie. Their pitching has been little short of miraculous.

John Rigney, who barely escaped pitching for Uncle Sam's army—getting deferment because of a perforated eardrum—pitched the White Sox to a 9-0 triumph over the Athletics yesterday.

With the Yankees in a mild slump and their powerhouse, Joe DiMaggio, out of action for possibly two weeks with a sprained ankle, the White Sox could very easily throw

a couple of scares into the Meathymen. Stranger things have happened in baseball.

In stopping the A's on three hits, Rigney registered his second straight 3 hit shutout, having beaten the Indians, 1-0, in his last start.

Meanwhile, the dogfight between the Dodgers and Cardinals continued in the National league. Brooklyn nosed out Pittsburgh in a weird game, 7-6, but lost half a game to the Cardinals who won two from the Braves, 2-0 and 3-2. The Dodgers' lead is now a game and a half.

Kirby Higbe, who's never beaten the Pirates in a starting role, couldn't protect a 4-0 lead and was hammered out of the box in the third when Pittsburgh scored six times. Pete Reiser's homer in the ninth tied it and Brooklyn won in the tenth without a hit. Gustine booted Merman's roller and then two walks filled the bags. With two out Elliott dropped Lavaget's easy fly, allowing the winning run.

Ernie White and Howard Pollet, rookie southpaw from Houston making his first major league start, lamed the Braves in the Cards' double win. White twirled a 6-hitter and Pollet allowed only 4 hits. The Cards lost their captain and centerfielder, Terry Moore, for an indefinite period when he was "beamed" by southpaw Art Johnson in the first game.

In the other National league games the Reds copped a pair from the Phillies, 2-0 and 3-0, and the Cubs outgated the Giants, 9-4.

Johnny Vander Meer pitched a 3-hitter for his 13th victory in the opener and Elmer Riddle fashioned a 6-hitter for his 14th win in the nightcap.

With DiMaggio laid up with his injured ankle and Setkirk in the lineup, the Yankees' attack dwindled to a 1-0, in 10 innings. Tommy Bridges allowed only two hits. Keller's first inning single that slid under York's glove and Sturm's grounded in the sixth which Higgins knocked down but couldn't recover in time to get the runner.

The Browns made it ten victories in their last 12 games with the Red Sox by winning a pair, 11-9 and 4-3 (10 innings) despite Ted Williams' two homers (making five in two days for him) which ran his total to 28.

Despite a shakeup in the lineup Cleveland lost its eighth straight, a 6-3 decision to Washington.

Southpaw Ray Prim blanked the Seals in the opener on five hits while his team won the game with three runs in the first inning. Y., who has won more matches in the last five national amateur golf tournaments than any other player, met trans-Mississippi Champion Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio, in the 36-hole finals of the first annual Great Lakes amateur championship today.

Billows defeated Ward with his putter, winning the three holes on the greens to close out the match. Ward left for Omaha today for as many practice rounds as he can get in before next Monday's U. S. amateur qualifying rounds.
