

Stanford Beaten In Major Upset Of Week-End

Oregon Overpowers U. S. C. for First Time Since 1915; 20-6

San Francisco, Oct. 13 (AP)—The Pacific Coast conference race for the Rose Bowl, after three big football Saturdays, today was right back where it started, only more so.

Seven of the eight major teams in the conference have lost conference games and Washington State has been beaten twice. Independent Santa Clara is unbeaten, but the Rose Bowl has a closed shop contract with the conference. Stanford, which won 13 straight games starting with the last game of 1939, fell from grace Saturday when a big, fast, fighting Oregon State college team dumped the Indians, 10-0. A wet ball and some Stanford injuries contributed to the defeat, but there were no complaints about the victory which established the Beavers as a top contender for the Rose Bowl.

Oregon, tied for the conference lead with Stanford, Oregon State and U. C. L. A., overpowered University of Southern California, 29-6. Oregon is now the highest-scoring team in the conference, with 56 points in three league games. It was Oregon's first win over U. S. C. since 1915.

Washington finally got into motion to wallop Washington State, 23-13. The Cougars got a 13-2 lead at the half, but Washington rolled through for three touchdowns in the last two periods.

Santa Clara, gunning for another post-season bowl game, still ran at half speed, although whipping California, 13-0. The Broncos were held scoreless for two periods but finally snatched two breaks for touchdowns.

U. C. L. A. won a conference game from Montana, 14-7, Friday night. St. Marys beat U. S. F. 30-0 to Sunday.

Oregon has a chance to win undisputed first place next week by beating California at Portland. Washington can move into contention with a win over U. C. L. A. and if U. S. C. beats W. S. C., the Trojans will move into the group that has two wins and one defeat. Oregon State will be idle and Stanford has a breather against the U. S. F. Santa Clara plays an important intersectional game with Michigan State.

Bears and Giants Top Pro Leagues

New York, Oct. 14 (AP)—The National league football season still is an infant but it looks as if it's over already unless somebody can ambush the New York Giants or Chicago Bears.

Unless there's an unprecedented reversal of form the Giants and Bears will win the sectional championships and meet for the world's gridiron title at Chicago Sunday, December 14. Off their early season form there is a very good chance that both will go through their regular campaigns undefeated.

The Giants have won four straight without drawing a deep breath; beating the Philadelphia Eagles twice, the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Washington Redskins once each. Except for a trip across the river to play the Dodgers in Brooklyn, they have the rest of their games at the Polo Grounds.

The Bears appear to be more powerful than last year's championship outfit if that is possible. They've clicked off three straight, beating the Packers, Rams and Cardinals, and have averaged 40 points a game.

Passing the Cardinals silly Sunday, the Bears hunt up a 53-7 triumph over their south side rivals before 34,688 fans. The Bears gained 613 yards and scored the most decisive victory in the 21-year series with the Cardinals. George McAfee cut loose with runs of 59 and 74 yards.

The Giants coasted to an easy 16-0 win over the Eagles before 30,842 paid customers at the Polo Grounds. Howie Yeager's 39-yard touchdown run on a naked reverse featured the game.

The Washington Redskins stayed in the running for the eastern title, defeating Pittsburgh, 24-20, before a crowd of 18,731 at Forbes field. The Steelers passed to two touchdowns in the final period.

Playing their best game of the season, the Green Bay Packers riddled the Brooklyn Dodgers with passes and end sweeps for a 30-7 triumph before 15,621 at Green Bay. Don Hutson scored two touchdowns, one on a pass and the other on an end-round play.

The Detroit Lions scored their first league victory, defeating the Cleveland Rams, 17-7, before 26,481 at Detroit. The Rams didn't score until the last minute of play.

Cochrane May Refuse to Fight

Summit, N. J., Oct. 13 (AP)—Freddie Cochrane, welterweight champion, said today that unless his manager, Willie Gilzenberg, is reinstated by the New York boxing commission, he will not go through with his scheduled bout with Ray Robinson of New York at Madison Square Garden Oct. 31.

Gilzenberg has been suspended for six months for allegedly ordering Cochrane to "coast" during his victory over Lew Jenkins last Monday.

In a telegram to Commissioner John Pheasant, Cochrane said he would not honor any contract but that signed by Gilzenberg. He said he would consider himself suspended also unless Gilzenberg were reinstated.

Seattle Man Chosen to Head Pacific Northwest Skiers

Ellensburg, Wash., Oct. 13 (AP)—Granstrom of Seattle today headed the Pacific Northwest Ski association after a close election victory over Otto Sanford, the incumbent, also of Seattle, at the association's annual meeting here yesterday.

Willamette and Lutes Hold Lead

Willamette university and Pacific Lutheran college rolled along without challenge today on the upper crust of Northwest conference and the Washington intercollegiate conference, respectively, and presented convincing evidence that they were in a class by themselves.

Willamette has scored 140 points in four games, while holding opponents to exactly zero. The latest victim was lowly Linfield college, walloped on its home gridiron Friday night, 43-0. The Beavers scored four touchdowns in the first quarter for their second conference win.

Pacific Lutheran's police was ruffed at Tacoma Saturday night by a under-rated St. Martin eleven, but the Lutes managed to send Fullback Marv Harshman over from the seven-yard line in the third period for a 7-0 victory—their 13th in a row.

The only other conference game was in the northwest loop, with Fullback Dick Clarke booting a conversion to give Whitman college a 7-6 victory over College of Puget Sound at Walla Walla.

Other teams marked time with non-conference games. At Bellingham, Western Washington College of Education held Portland university to a 6-6 tie, and at Spokane, Eastern Washington college drubbed Whitworth college 35-7.
