

# Bears to Meet Medford's Black Tornado Friday

### Southern Oregon Squad Rated as One of Best in State; Bend Improves

Bend on Friday night will meet what appears to be Oregon's most powerful football team of the season, the Black Tornado of Medford, a squad which last week defeated Klamath Falls 32 to 21 in a wide open battle. The Bend-Medford game this year will be played on the Medford gridiron. The Bears will enter the game definitely as the underdog team, primarily because of the power shown by the Black Tigers in southern Oregon games.

However, the Bend team that faces Medford Friday night will be near its peak strength, it was indicated here today. Two weeks ago, Bend held the undefeated Indians of The Dalles to a two-touchdown victory, and last Friday night Bend rolled up its most impressive score of the season, 47 to 7, at the expense of Molalla. That was Bend's only "breather" of the season. Against Molalla, Bend not only used all its reserves, but members of the Cub team were also in action. Twice during the Molalla game, a Cub backfield, wearing the old uniforms of the Lava Bears, worked against the Buckaroos.

So far this season, Medford has been cutting an impressive swath through Oregon high schools. Even back on September 25, the Black Tigers were on the prowl, having defeated Corvallis on that date, 41 to 0. And Corvallis, it will be recalled, last week-end defeated the previously unbeaten Salem eleven, 13 to 7. Last autumn, it was Bend that was mowing down undefeated Oregon teams, as the powerful Bears bluffed their way to a state championship. Bend last fall defeated Medford 19 to 6 in the finals of the state championship series, as big Jim Byers ran wild, scoring three touchdowns. One of Byers' touchdowns was a 65 yard gallop. In winning from Medford last October, the Bears broke a 26-game winning streak for the Black Tigers.

# Michigan Faces Golden Gophers

Chicago, Oct. 21 (AP)—Very much to check Minnesota's golden horde against its wishes, Michigan must revert to its old system of a "punt, a pass and a prayer" in an effort in Saturday's game of the week between unbeaten, untied teams. The punt and pass whipped Northwestern last week, 14 to 7, but now comes a prayer for Michigan's 60 minute men—four players who endured a full hour of pounding against Northwestern and face another uninterrupted stretch against what may be the champion of all the Minnesota powerhouses of modern football history.

Pressing need of Coach Fritz Crisler is reserve material. His ends, Joe Rogers and Harlin Framman, went the distance last week end in the latter states, were extremely vulnerable. Tackle Al Wistert and Quarterback George Ceithaml also played without relief and if anything happens to either, Michigan will be in a bad way for its shot at Minnesota's Big Ten championship. In contrast, Minnesota appears to be somewhere near that "three-deep" description the coaches and scouts love to tell about. The Gophers also are well rested after tripping Illinois, 34 to 6, and Pittsburgh, 39 to 0, the last two Saturdays.

# Football Player Seeks Deferment

San Francisco, Oct. 21 (AP)—The United States circuit court of appeals today took under advisement the plea of a Gonzaga university football player for draft deferment.

Attorneys for Peter Connors, the grid player, won a preliminary injunction in the Montana federal district court against draft board No. 1 of Silver Bow county, Mont., on the plea he should be permitted to finish his college football career. He intends to play professional football upon graduation "and a football star shines brightest in his senior year," Connors agreed. The draft board appealed the injunction on the grounds Federal Judge James Baldwin was without jurisdiction in the case and had made a "gross error" in upholding Connors' stand. The player's attorneys argued yesterday the draft board had "arrived at the cast iron rule that he is a liberal arts student and therefore shouldn't receive consideration." "He was never permitted to appeal to the discretion of the draft board, nor could he ever ask why he shouldn't be given deferment," the defense said.

# Maxie Baer to Enlist in Navy

Denver, Oct. 21 (AP)—Max Baer said yesterday he was following the example of Gene Tunney and joining the navy. Baer, who with his manager, Ancl Hoffman, was in Denver, said he would confer with Lt. Com. Tunney, athletic director for sailors, in San Francisco next week. "However, I'm not retiring," Maxie pointed out. He said he wanted to take on Billy Conn next June.

# By J. R. Williams Upland Bird Season to Open

The open season on upland birds, especially quail and pheasants, will open in various counties of Oregon, one of them Deschutes, tomorrow morning. The pheasant season opens on October 22 in Deschutes, Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Coos, Klamath, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla, Wal-lowa, Union, Baker, Grant and Crook will remain open until November 4. A shorter season is provided for Harney, Wheeler, Lake and Jefferson counties, opening tomorrow and closing on November 1. In northwestern Oregon counties, the pheasant season opens on October 22 and provides for hunting on only three days.

The quail season opens tomorrow in Crook, Deschutes, Grant, Jefferson, Harney, Wheeler, Klamath, Lake, Umatilla, Gilliam, Wasco, Sherman, Morrow, Coos, Jackson, Josephine and Douglas counties and ends on November 4. The season on Hungarian partridge also opens tomorrow in designated counties, one of which is Deschutes, and closes on November 4. The pheasant bag limit is three male birds in any one day, but not more than nine such birds during the entire open season. The quail bag is ten birds in any seven days, or in possession as any one time. The partridge limit is six birds in any one day. It is unlawful to use shotguns capable of holding more than three shells to hunt or kill any upland game birds, or migratory waterfowl.

Left Half Ray Forbes is out, perhaps for the season, with a twisted knee. All injuries resulted in the S. F. U. game.
