

Rally Sends Stock Prices Higher

New York, Oct. 21 (AP)—German admission of stiff Russian resistance in the Moscow campaign plus unrest in German occupied territory, stimulated a rally on the stock market today.

Prices moved up fractions to more than a point with volume more equally distributed than yesterday, when principal business was in a few penny stocks, dumped to register tax losses.

United Corporation, which provided 28 per cent of all dealings yesterday, still was relatively active, but its volume was topped by Westinghouse Electric and General Gas & Electric A. General Electric, U. S. Steel, Atlantic Coast Line and Calumet & Hecla were active.

Heavy trading came into Calumet when the office of production management worked out an agreement for an increased ceiling price for the company and for Isle Royal and Copper Range Mines in upper Michigan. The copper price ceiling for Calumet was raised to 16 cents a pound for a period of six months. The ceiling for low cost copper producers is 12 cents a pound. Other copper shares were irregular, with Anaconda up nearly a point and Cerro de Pasco down 1/4 point.

United States Steel gained more than a point in its high and Bethlehem was nearly a point higher. Jones & Laughlin was up 1 1/2 at 22 1/2.

Chrysler gained more than a point. Aircraft issues were up fractions to more than a point, the latter in Douglas, Consolidated and Lockheed.

Other issues to rise a point or more included American Woolen preferred, Bond Stores, Hercules powder, Philip Morris preferred, New York Shipbuilding, Proctor & Gamble and Texas Corporation.

Central Violeta Sugar moved higher when directors declared a dividend for the first time since 1939. Other sugar issues were firm.

Amusement issues registered small gains except Warner Brothers preferred, which declined a point. Atlantic Gulf & West Indies preferred, strong spot yesterday, declined 2 points on a single transaction.

Railroad issues moved up fractionally. Some rail equipments strengthened. Chemicals improved fractionally. U. S. Gypsum rose nearly a point. Electrical equipments firmed after Westinghouse Electric made a new low and General Electric equalled its low for the year.

American Telephone 3 per cent debentures continued to feature dealings on the bond market. More than \$5,000,000 par value of the issue turned over early. Japanese bonds had declines ranging from more than 4 points and German loans were easier. Domestic issues firmed after early irregularity.

A spurt of more than 4 cents of bushel in wheat and a rise of nearly \$2 a bale in cotton featured strong commodity markets. Fair gains were noted in hides and cocoa.

Cavalry Horses Receive Food Tested for Energy

Fort Riley, Kas. (AP)—Tests undertaken by the cavalry replacement center here show that an army horse requires about 28,000 calories a day.

A horse should be fed nine times as much caloric energy as a soldier although in proportion to size the horse requires one-ninth less feed, the survey showed.

Each cavalry horse here receives 13 pounds of hay, 11 pounds of oats, 4 pounds of alfalfa and 8 ounces of bran.

CAA Flight Work To Begin Soon

Redmond, Oct. 21—The start of flight instruction in the second civilian pilot training course to be held in Central Oregon has been somewhat delayed, but is expected to get under way at Roberts field within a week or ten days. Instructor Ernest L. Sink said Monday.

Minor changes in the enrollment procedure resulted in a delay in clearing records through CAA headquarters at Washington, D. C., Sink explained, but this is expected to be completed shortly.

Five students, who earned flight scholarships in the ground school course recently completed, will take the course.

Sink expects that half a dozen members of the first CPT course will qualify for secondary flight training. Deferment of selective service will be asked for those students whose numbers have been called and who are expected to receive the advanced aviation training.
