

Theory of Mount Multnomah Is Questioned

California Geologist Finds No Evidence of Huge Ancient Peak

Mount Multnomah, ghost mountain of the ancient past believed by some geologists to have dominated the Cascade skyline west of Bend for long ages, faces a scientific collapse, or at least a geologic controversy. Dr. Howell Williams, University of California geologist who spent this past summer studying the Three Sisters region, reports that he found not the slightest evidence for the Mount Multnomah theory.

The North Sister, the Husband, Sphinx and Broken Top, formerly believed to be the remnants of a massive mountain of remote days which Dr. Edwin T. Hodge, Oregon geologist, called Multnomah, are actually individual volcanoes, Dr. Williams reports. Details of his findings will be announced by Dr. Williams in a report on the Three Sisters country. Dr. Williams is now working on that report.

Although Dr. Williams found no evidence of the skeleton of an imaginary mountain in the Three Sisters region, he found plenty of interesting features.

"I doubt if anywhere in the Cascade range there are more graphic examples of dissected volcanoes than in the Three Sisters region," Dr. Williams writes. "Glacial erosion has revealed these volcanoes' internal structure, radial dikes, central conduit fill-ups, etc., to perfection."

"Nor do I know any part of the Cascades richer in informative landscape and in extent and variety of recent volcanic activity. The place is a geological paradise!"

Dr. Williams has already published reports on Crater lake and on Newberry crater. In addition, the California geologist published a popularized description of Mount Mazama, volcano of the miocene which is believed to have exploded and collapsed, forming the Crater lake caldera.

The California scientist visited Bend briefly last summer, before establishing camp in the Three Sisters region.

It was some 15 years ago that Dr. Hodge published his Mount Multnomah theory and announced that evidence had been found that the tall Cascade peaks west of Bend are the remnants of a massive volcano of old which rivalled Mazama on the southern skyline.

Collecting Hobby Nets

Of Early Hitler Speeches
Philadelphia (UP)—Phonographic records of speeches by Adolf Hitler and other German leaders during the early part of the Nazi regime have been presented to the University of Pennsylvania.

The recordings, believed to be the only ones now in existence, were donated to the university by Dr. Robert M. W. Kempner, who was legal advisor to the Prussian police under the Weimar Republic. They were confiscated by state police raids on early Nazi headquarters in Berlin.

Professors at the university plan to use the records in the teaching of European history and political science.
