

Ballard Equals Meet Record At Hill Race

Devereaux' Mark of Last Year Matched; Team Places Third

First place in the high school division of the 11th running of the Hill Military academy cross country meet Wednesday afternoon in Portland was won by Bend's Layton Ballard, who not only nosed out the Pacific northwest's best interscholastic hill and dale pacers, but tied the former record of 10:32, to equal Leon Devereaux' record established last year.

Ballard lost a shoe three-quarters of a mile from the finish, but kept right on moving to win the event. Although Bend won first place in this division of the annual cross-country run, the Boars lacked sufficient reserve strength to earn a team victory. The team championship was won by Washington high, of Portland, although the Portland team did not place among the first few finishers. The well-balanced Washington team won with 107 points. Benson nosed out Bend for second place in the team standings, 125 to 126. Other prep scores were:

Lincoln, 149; Molalla, 152; Canby, 159; Commerce, 173; Salem, 173; West Linn, 180; Hill, 285, and Roosevelt, 346. Bill Ludwig, one of the Bear runners, was among the first runners to cover the Rocky butte course. It was Jack Bolter, of Lincoln, Portland, who finished second to Ballard. Art Cole, St. Helens, was third.

Last year, Bend not only set a new time for the interscholastic competition, but won the meet, as Devereaux, Ballard and a nice group of backer uppers crossed the line ahead of a huge field of runners. Devereaux and most of the other Bend runners of last year were lost through graduation, leaving the heavy work to Ballard.

Coch Coach Claude Cook took 11 runners to Portland for the competition, leaving here Tuesday. In the senior division were Ballard, Ludwig, Ives, Sullivan, Fagg, Berrigan and Moore. In the junior division were Anderson, Ballantyne, Woods and Allan.

In the intercollegiate division of the cross-country run, the Vandals of Idaho were again winners, for the fifth consecutive time. The Idaho team count of 19 was a record. The previous low was 22, set by Idaho last year.

Stanford edged out Oregon State and the University of Portland in a three-way fight for second. The Cards had 70, Oregon State 72 and Portland 74.

Individual honors went to Victor Drygall, of Idaho. The Idaho harrier took five out of the first seven places in the college competition.

Hostak to Fight In Garden Tonight

New York, a Nov. 21 (AP)—Al Hostak, Seattle's blond bomber, will be unveiled at last in Madison Square Garden tonight, with ancient Ken Overlin an important participant in the ceremony.

Hostak, who never fought east of Cleveland, is slated for 10 rounds with the ex-sailor of Washington, D. C. The bout is ultra-important for both former middleweight kings, since it officially launches their campaigns for the light-heavyweight crown.

Overlin, though 31, is favored at 8-5 to ruin Hostak's eastern debut because of his cleverness and ruggedness. Also because his 25-year-old opponent has had a seasaw career due to brittle hands. Hand injuries have contributed to at least three important defeats suffered by the Seattle Czech since he wrestled the middleweight crown (National Boxing association brand) from Freddie Steel on a first-round knockout in July, 1938.

Had tonight's bout been staged 18 months ago it would have drawn more than \$150,000 outdoors, bringing together the N. B. A. ruler and Overlin, who was recognized as champion in New York and affiliated states. Because of reverses suffered by both since then, it will be lucky to gross \$25,000.

Overlin won the New York state then lost it to Billy Soose on a diadem by licking Ceferino Gracia in May, 1940. He held it a year; May 9.

Meanwhile, Hostak—after taking the N. B. A. crown from Steele—lost it to Veteran Solly Grier of Brooklyn on a decision, and then re-captured it from Krieger on a knockout. Hostak invaded Chicago in January, 1940, and dropped a non-title decision to Tony Zale. Six months later Zale took the crown at Seattle by knocking Al out in the 13th. Hostak tried to get it back at Chicago last May 28, but Zale knocked him out in the second round after flooring him eight times.

TEAMS TIE

Astoria, Nov. 21 (AP)—Linfield college and Fort Stevens battled four quarters to a scoreless tie on a muddy field here yesterday. A small Thanksgiving day crowd witnessed the clash.

Unbeaten Teams To End Season

New York, Nov. 21 (AP)—Three of the four top bidders for the mythical national championship—Minnesota, Duke and Motre Dame—wash up their regular schedules tomorrow in the final big Saturday of the 1941 football campaign and all three of them will be heavily favored to come out of their last game with undefeated records intact.

The Golden Gophers face the high-scoring Badgers of Wisconsin in a contest which can give them their second straight western conference crown and stretch their victory string to 17 consecutive triumphs. Duke meets North Carolina State in a game expected to settle matters in the southern conference and produce the Blue Devils as a top bowl eligible.

While they aren't running for any sectional title, the Irish of Notre Dame will oppose Southern California in a bid for their first undefeated season since 1930—the year the late Knute Rockne came up with his last and probably greatest eleven. Although the Irish are suffering from many injuries, the Trojans have been beaten four times.

They are the most important events on the national card but at several other points of the country fans will turn out for contests equally engrossing. The Tigers of Missouri will attempt to wrap up the Big Six title by conquering weak Kansas and in the far west Washington will try to keep its Rose bowl hopes alive against Oregon.

Willamette Wins Football Title

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 21 (AP)—Willamette university today held the northwest football conference title by virtue of a 28 to 0 victory over Whitman college before a crowd of 4,000 persons.

Undefeated in nine consecutive games, Willamette now goes to Honolulu for a game with University of Hawaii early in December.

The winners set up each of their scores on long passes from Reynolds to Reeder, Morley and Ogden. Whitman, completely out-classed, made only one scoring threat late in the third quarter.
