

Foul Shot Gives Ashland 19 to 18 Win Over Bears

Score Knotted 18 All With 40 Seconds to Play, Then Riggs Scores

A free shot in the final 40 seconds of play gave the Ashland Grizzlies a 19 to 18 victory here last night over a greatly improved Lava Bear basketball team which only the week before dropped its first game of the season to Lapine, 26 to 23. With two minutes to go last night, Douglass, only regular from last year's squad, made good a foul shot to tie the count 18 to 18.

In a wild finish that brought fans out of their seats, the score remained tied, until Riggs of the Grizzlies stepped to the free throw line to toss in the ball for the winning point.

Although losers, the young Bears showed vast improvement over their play of a week ago. At the start of last night's game, they stepped into a 5 to 2 lead at the end of the first quarter and at half time held a 7 to 6 lead. Ashland took the lead early in the last half and held it until Douglass tied the count in the final minutes of play. The Ashland team was lighter and smaller than the Lava Bears, but by close guarding they held the Bears well out on the floor. Neither team got many clear shots at the basket. The height of Klobas and Youngberg of the Bend team gave the Bears a definite advantage in work under the baskets.

Tonight, at 8 p. m., the two teams will renew their warfare on the Bend court, with all signs indicating that another thriller will be played. The Cubs will meet the Lapine high school team in the preliminary.

In last night's game, the Cubs, coached by Claude Cook, won from the Sisters team 17 to 8. At half time, the Cubs held a mere 6 to 4 lead. Players who saw action for the Cubs included Rines, Baughn, Neff, Reynolds, Hawes, Wallan, Powell, Woods and Halligan. Sisters used two full teams against the Cubs. 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WHY MOTHERS GET GRAY

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Zivic and McCoy Fight to Draw

New York, Dec. 13 (AP)—Activity in the welterweight division was halted today until physicians report on the condition of the two badly battered eyes suffered by Fritz Zivic of Pittsburgh and Young Kid McCoy of Detroit in their 10-round draw at Madison Square Garden last night.

Both of the 147 pounders came out of their furious battle with eyes badly puffed and possibly cut. Zivic, whose eye was hurt as early as the fifth round, was believed more severely injured. McCoy's eye didn't begin to swell until near the end of the bout.

Promoter Mike Jacobs had announced that the winner of the match would meet Ray (Sugar) Robinson, undefeated Harlem negro, but the draw upset his plans and a rematch may be scheduled. The 9,571 customers who paid \$22,678 to see Jacobs' first war time bout probably would return for a repeat.

Although there were no knockdowns and neither boy was staggered, the bout was a fast and furious one. McCoy, whose real name is Adam Pianga, solved Zivic's peculiar style late in the match and earned his draw with a spectacular last round rally during which he rocked Zivic all around the ring.

The fight was rough, replete with low blows, thumping, elbowing and liberal use of shoulders but Referee Arthur Donovan only once called a halt to the proceedings—he penalized Zivic in the fourth round for hitting below the belt.

Cougar Quintet Swamps Montana

Pullman, Wash., Dec. 13 (AP)—The Washington state college basketball team, last year's Pacific Coast conference winner, had little trouble in swamping Montana State university last night, 74-45. The Cougars led at half time, 34-24.

Four of Bums Leave Brooklyn

New York, Dec. 13 (AP)—Brooklyn said goodbye to four of the beloved bums today but the brief ceremony was obscured by general rejoicing that Arky Vaughan, for 10 years one of the most potent batters in the National league would play for the Dodgers in 1942.

Vaughan was procured yesterday in one of the biggest deals of the annual winter trading season and one which removed two of General Manager Larry McPhail's irritating problems—Pitcher Luke (Home Run Ball) Hamlin and Catcher Babe (The Bump) Phelps—from the Dodger roster.

Hamlin, Phelps, reserve infielder Pete Coscarart and outfielder Jimmy Waddell were traded to the Pittsburgh Pirates for the stocky Bue infielder. Although the cost appears high, it actually wasn't.

That's because Phelps had played on 16 games when he quit the Dodgers on a western trip last year; Hamlin fell far from the form which won him 20 games two years ago; and Coscarart was used mainly as a runner in a few contests. Waddell was the most important Dodger in the trade. He hit .299 in 94 games and was an excellent performer in the field.

The deal, more or less expected, came as a slight surprise because the National league meeting in Chicago ended officially Thursday. MacPhail had announced he was after two men—Vaughan and Johnny Mize of St. Louis, who was stolen away by the New York Giants.

Vaughan will plug at least one and maybe two gaps in the Brooklyn infield. He is 30, married and not likely to be called for military service. He will take over the shortstop position if Pee Wee Reese, now classified I-A, is inducted into the army.

Until then, however, MacPhail and Manager Leo Durocher are expected to tussle over Lavagetto at third base. Vaughan will play there as long as Reese remains with the team and his batting prowess is certain to add punch to the Dodger attack.

Vaughan has played in the Pittsburgh infield for 10 years and while no Zorina in the field, he has compiled a lifetime batting average of .320. His best average was in 1935 when he won the National league championship at .385 and was selected as the league's most valuable player. Last year he played in only 106 games and hit .316. He hit two home runs against the American league in the all-star game.

Southern Oregon Wins 57-55 Game

Ashland, Dec. 13 (AP)—Southern Oregon College of Education last night squeezed a 57-55 basketball win over Eastern Oregon College of Education in its first Oregon Intercollegiate conference clash.

The Sons trailed 31-7 at the half, but sparked by the offensive floorwork of Forward Spayde managed to gain the lead. Rostock, Mountaineer guard, led the scorers with 27. Mulder scored 18 for Southern Oregon.

Army Title Game Is Cancelled

Seattle, Dec. 13 (AP)—The west coast service championship football game between Moffett Field, Cal., and the Arkansas Travelers of Fort Lewis, scheduled here today, has been cancelled by army authorities without explanation.

The order was issued upon instructions of Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt, fourth army commander. Previously, both Fort Lewis and Moffett Field had approved the match.

The Moffett Field team had already arrived for the game.

Rose Bowl Game Plans Progress

Corvallis, Dec. 13 (AP)—Plans for the Oregon State-Duke Rose Bowl football game are progressing in a normal way despite the Pacific war, Percy Loeey, O. S. C. athletic director, wired his office from Pasadena today.

Loeey said ticket sales were good and that mail orders of tickets yesterday were the heaviest since he arrived at the Rose Bowl headquarters. A big Oregon State rooting section was assured yesterday when student ticket sales on the campus passed the 1,000 mark. About 100 band members and the rally committee were also scheduled to attend the game.
