

Beavers Defeat Washington State In Overtime Play

O. S. C. Is Star as
Corvallis Team Wins
By Score of 52 to 47

Corvallis, Jan. 13 (AP)—With sharpshooting Lew Beck of Pendleton leading the way, Oregon State college opened its conference season here last night by defeating Washington State college 52-47 in an overtime period.

Beck, smallest man on the floor, made two baskets and a free throw during the overtime period to take scoring honors with 17 points.

The score at the end of the regular playing period stood at 46-all. The Beavers held the Cougars to a single free throw by Zimmerman in the extra session.

The game was so close that not more than four points were separated at the end of the second half. The score was tied eight times and the lead changed half-a-dozen times.

At the end of the first period, the Beavers had a one-point lead, 24-23.

Coach Jack Friel of Washington State alternated two complete teams, while Slab Gill used all lettermen, with the exception of sophomore Beck. Al Atkins, Cougar sophomore, was high scorer for the Cougars with 12 points, followed by Gale Bishop, center, with 11. Bishop did fine work in holding down John Mandic, star Beaver center, to seven points.

A second game is scheduled for tonight.

Hogan and Thomson to Meet In Playoff for \$3500 Prize

Los Angeles, Jan. 13 (AP)—Little Ben Hogan of Texas and big Jimmy Thomson of California meet today in a David-Goliath playoff for the \$3500 first prize of the Los Angeles open golf tournament.

The match is an anti-climax to yesterday's final round, when Hogan, needing a par and a birdie on the last two holes to tie for first place, came through under pressure and matched Thomson's 282 for the four rounds. Thomson's play means, however, that the victor will get \$3500 and the loser \$1700. Hogan's brilliant finish was an uphill effort. As he teed off the 16th, he learned Thomson was already in with a 282. To win he needed two birdies and a par on the three remaining holes. He could—and did—tie the husky Del Monte, Cal., pro with par on two and a birdie.

Thomson went into the early lead with a consistently better game day by day, cutting each round by one stroke. He parred the tricky Hillcrest Country club layout the first day with a 72. He made it in 71 Saturday, posted a 70 on Sunday and finished with a 69 yesterday. Hogan's four day total was 70-70-72-70—282.

Harry Cooper of Minneapolis, who paced the field going into the final round, tied for third at 285, with Slamming Sammy Snead of Hot Springs, Va., and Chick Harbert of Battle Creek, Mich. The two shared third, fourth and fifth money and won \$900 apiece.

Snead could have tied the winning score with a par on the last hole. He was three under par coming to the 18th. After two shots put him in a gully below the green, a chip shot fell just short of the apron and rolled back. A

Bettina Makes Bid for Title

Pittsburgh, Jan. 13 (AP)—Making his bid for heavyweight recognition, Melo Bettina, former light heavyweight champion, slashed out a unanimous decision over Mose Brown, of McKeesport, Pa., last night before a crowd of 6200 at the Gardens.

It was Bettina's 29th win as a heavyweight but he had to win the fight to be considered for a possible March indoor bout with the heavyweight champion, Joe Louis.

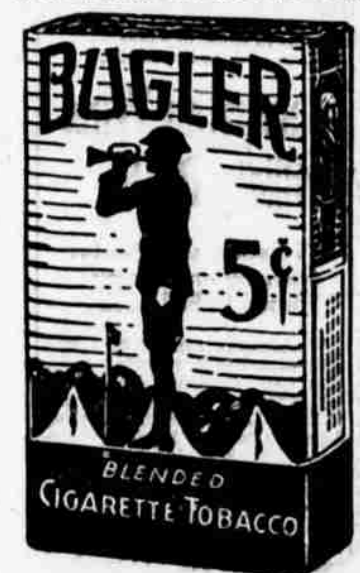

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Perry have purchased the Weirsma ranch on the Alfalfa market road and expect to move in March.

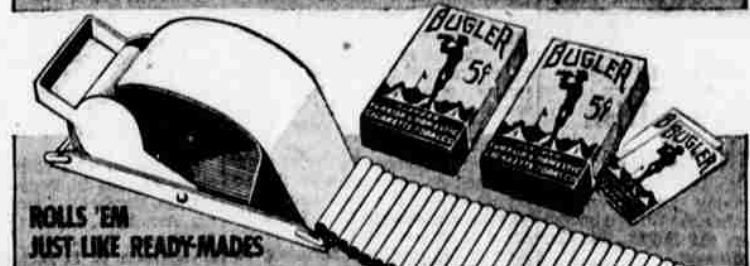
