

Washington Turns Tables on O. S. C. Beavers

Second Game of Series Won by Huskies, 43-38; Beck Scores 14 Points

Corvallis, Jan. 21 (AP)—The University of Washington's Huskies evened things up last night by defeating Oregon State college 43-38 in a close basketball game here. In the first half, Washington took a six-point lead, but by half time Oregon State was in front 19-15. The Huskies passed the Beavers again in the second half, but two baskets by Beck and one by Valenti in the last minute cut the Washington lead down to five.

Beck was high for Oregon State with 14 points, while Lindh and Gilmur made ten each for the Huskies.

Washington made 16 baskets out of 33 chances. Oregon State accounted for 14 out of 41.

Lapine Defeats Cubs 58 to 30

Coach Phil Craft's high geared Lapine basket shooters met Coach Claude Cook's Cubs here last night, fainted in a slow start, then spurred ahead to win from the Cubs 58 to 30. The midweek game was a practice affair for each of the teams, and the coaches took opportunity of trying out practically their entire squads. Earlier in the season, it will be recalled, the Lapine varsity defeated Bend's varsity in a hard-fought, close game.

In the preliminary contest last night, the Bend junior high team won from the Lapine varsity reserves 28 to 25 in the thriller of the evening. Ability to convert free throws was largely responsible for the junior high victory. Two of the Lapine reserves were benched on personals, and the junior hoopers took advantage of the free shots to add to the 18 points amassed through field goals. Haupt, Perry, Galvin, Ferguson and Murphy started for the junior high team, and Raehy, Miltenberger, Posey, R. Carpenter and Sumpter were in the Lapine reserve starting lineup.

In the main event of the evening, the Lapine varsity started in slow motion, probably to fool the Bend defense, then quickly shifted into high gear to roll up a half time score of 35 to 10. In the second half, the Cubs, although definitely playing out of their class, refused to quit and amassed 20 points to 23 for the visitors.
