Obsolete Tire Sizes Are Given by Rationing Board

Sizes of tires designated by the OPA as "obsolete" today were released by the Bend tire rationing board. Persons whose automobiles require tires in the obsolete category must file an application for new tires and have the same inspection as those whose tires are of more standard sizes. However, there is no occupational ban on tires designated as obsolete, the board emphasized.

Any person whose automobile requires any of these sizes of tires will receive the tires, provided it cannot be recapped, retreaded or repaired. A person driving with obsolete size tires does not have to be in the special occupations as does the person who drives with other sizes of tires, the board explained.

The following tire sizes have been defined as obsolete by the OPA: 525-19; 525-550-19; 550-19; 600-19; 600-650-19; 650-19; 700-19; 750-19; 450-20; 475-20; 500-20; 525-20; 550-20; 600-20; 600-650-20; 650-20; 440-450-21; 440-21; 450-21; 475-21; 500-21; 525-21; 600-21; 650-21; 700-21; 500-22; 600-22; 750-14; 30x3; 30x3 1/2; 31x4; 32x4; 33x4; 32x 4 1/2; 33x4 1/2; 34x4 1/2.

Fine Watches Used in Shells

Bend jewelers are discovering at least one of the reasons they are experiencing difficulties in securing certain types of watches, reports J. B. Bear, operator of a jewelry store here. Here is the reason, as explained in the current number of the Pacific Goldsmith:

"Some of the defense work that our watch factories are doing consists of making thousands of rail-

road watch movements with an alarm device. These are placed in explosive shells and can be so timed that the watch mechanism fires or explodes the shell at a pre-determined distance from the muzzle of the gun."

This mechanism is said to be replacing fuses formerly used.
