

# Lava Bears Win Again on Harney County Floor

### Second Game of Burns Series Won 27 to 23 in Overtime Period

Bend's Lava Bear hoopmen, now on the home stretch of their 1941-42 season, won another game last night from Burns, defeating the Harney county boys 27 to 23 in an overtime period after taking the Thursday night contest 32 to 26. Both games were played on the Burns floor.

It was John Prince who sparked the Bears in their victory over the alert Bulldogs last night, accounting for nine of the 27 points scored by the Bears.

These were Bend's first victories of the 1941-42 season and followed the entire reorganization of the small Bear squad after all regulars and lettermen had been lost through a long series of misfortunes, ranging from the mumps to pneumonia.

**Two Games Remain**  
The Bears now have only two more games remaining on their year's schedule, and will then place their abbreviated suits in moth balls for the start of the track and baseball seasons. The Bears will tangle with Redmond next Friday night, then on March 6 the Panthers will come here for the closing game of the season. Scores recently made by Redmond against Klamath Falls indicate that the Bears will have some tough going in their final game of the year.

Coach Claude Cook, apparently well pleased with the work of his hard-working Cubs, made only one change in his lineup during the entire game.

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# Huskies Defeat O. S. C.; Oregon Loses to Idaho

### Washington State Holds Division Lead With Ducks in Collar

Washington came back into the running for the northern division, Pacific Coast conference, basketball championship today with a 47-40 victory over Oregon State college last night in Seattle to go into a second-place tie with the Beavers.

Idaho, meanwhile, emerged from the cellar for the first time by shading Oregon at Moscow, 38-36. The Webfoots went into last place.

The league-leading Washington State college Cougars were idle, not playing again until Monday when Oregon comes back to Pullman. Last night's opponents play again tonight.

It was a revitalized Washington machine that took the floor last night. The Huskies ran up a six-point lead midway in the first half after a see-saw start. Washington led, 22-19, at the half and was never headed thereafter.

**Mandic Out on Fouls**  
Oregon State was seriously handicapped by the loss of Center John Mandic, who left the game on personal fouls three minutes after the start of the second half. Mandic scored 12 points, all in the first period.

Idaho rallied in the last five minutes to beat Oregon in a nip-and-tuck battle.

Both teams started slowly, but Oregon took the lead first. Idaho forged ahead, 19-15, at the half. Oregon led again in the second half, only to lose the advantage when Norm Froelkind, sophomore Idaho guard, shot two field goals in the closing minutes.

The Vandals won the game at the foul line, taking advantage of 19 personal and three technical fouls called against the Webfoots. Idaho's final point came on a free throw resulting from a technical called against Coach Howard Hobson of Oregon for protesting an official's ruling.

Center Ray Turner and Forward Ted Thompson of Idaho tied for high point honors with 12 each. George (Porky) Andrews, Oregon guard, led the losers with 10.

Turner took over the division scoring lead with 135 points. Marv Gilberg of WSC has 128 and Gail Bishop of WSC 126. Mandic boosted his total to 124.

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# Sugar Robinson Wins 117th Bout

### New York, Feb. 21 (Special)—Brown-skinned Ray Robinson, 144 pounds of dancing dynamite, exploded two left hooks on Maxie Berger's chin, and another victory was added to the longest winning string in boxing history.

Referee Frankie Fullam stopped the bout at 1:43 of the second round when Berger—a squat Canadian—was on the floor for the second time. This technical knock-out gave 21-year-old Robinson of Harlem his 117th consecutive triumph as an amateur and professional.

Last night's bout was scheduled for 12 rounds, but the ease and speed with which slender Ray disposed of his seasoned opponent convinced the 12,464 fans in Madison Square Garden that he will be welterweight king of the world as soon as he can induce Champion Freddie Cochrane to give him a shot at the title. Berger, veteran of nearly a hundred professional battles, never had been stopped before.

**Week-End Skiing To Be Excellent**  
Ski lifters are looking forward to a weekend of good skiing on the Santiam summit, following the receipt of word that four inches of new snow covers the Hoodoo bowl area.

The ski lift will be operating at the Santiam bowl tomorrow, according to word released by the United States weather bureau.

Down south there is also plenty of snow at Crater lake, the depth at the ski bowl now measuring 100 inches. Depth at the park headquarters is 94 inches. Two inches of powdery snow covers a breakable crust at the Crater lake bowl.

Snow depth at Timberline lodge, in the Mount Hood area, is now 120 inches.

Reports indicate there is plenty of snow in the Cascades immediately west of Bend for winter sports enthusiasts willing to break new ski trails, or hike in over the Cascade lakes highway to the white slopes of Bachelor butte.
