Attendance Low At REA Meeting

Redmond, Feb. 21—Principal speaker at the annual meeting of the Central Electric cooperative held in Redmond Township club hall Friday, was P. R. Hamilton, of the operations division of REA.

Hamilton is from the Washington, D. C., office. He pressed home to the members present, the fact that they must continue their interest and enthusiasm in their association the same, since receiving electric energy as before. It is imperative, said Hamilton, to attend the annual meeting and all meetings, in order to keep in touch with the problems arising from time to time as well as keeping up their interest. He suggested that there is danger of losing their franchise if the interest is allowed to lag.

The cooperative is a quarter of a million dollar association, which is a branch of one of the largest groups in the United States. There are 800 cooperatives, spread throughout the country, all working under identical policies and program, said the speaker. He made the suggestion that one or two women on the board of management had brought back interest in other groups, and said, "You might try that here, I believe it would work."

Hamilton was preceded in his address by Carl Baker of Tumalo, president of the board of directors. Baker gave a general talk on conditions and operations.

It was learned that portable units can be supplied and installed in case of complications concerning current not being delivered. This has been done in a number of localities in Idaho.

Rates are being reduced as fast as usage and density warrant, the speaker said.

Since there were an insufficient number of members present to constitute a quorum the election of nine directors did not take place. This was to have been one of the chief features of the meeting. It has not been determined when another meeting will be held.

Oil Company Plans Auto Quiz

Virgil Lomax returned Friday from Portland, where he attended a northwest division meeting of the Gilmore Oil company and gained first hand information about the company's new autoquiz, which will provide motorists an opportunity of checking their driving knowledge. This autoquiz includes highlights of Pacific coast traffic laws, as well as information on how to get more mileage from gasoline and tires, and how to make the family car last longer.

First to try their skill at autoquiz in Portland were Gilmore officials from all parts of the state, who met in the Oregon metropolis to discuss sales and promotion for the coming year. The autoquiz was presented at the meeting in the form of photographic slides projected on a screen.

The Gilmore Oil company plans to maintain an extensive advertising campaign in 1942, it was disclosed at the Portland meet, while the company continues to devote an increasingly large share of its activities to the nation's common goal—winning the war.

Newspapers will continue to receive a relatively large share of the Gilmore advertising appropriation, it was indicated.

Legion Wants Japs Interned

Legionnaires of Bend at their meeting last night by a unanimous vote approved a resolution asking that all Japanese, including those born in America, be interned at once and held for the entire period of the emergency. "It is the opinion of all members of the American Legion that no time should be lost in the formation of a definite policy concerning the enemy alien problem," the resolution states.

Immediate internment, the resolution adds, would "make impossible acts of war or sabotage against the United States by any of them, and no innocent ones would then be under suspicion or possible attack."

The resolution also points out that "if these Japanese, guilty or innocent, are at large, any incident in connection with their conduct would be used as a basis for reprisals against our unfortunate nationals who are in the hands of the Japanese."

Copies of the Bend resolution will be forwarded to the United States attorney general, to Gov. Charles A. Sprague and to the American Legion, department of Oregon.

Fort Pitt Foundations Sought in Excavations

Pittsburgh, Pa.—Holes 20 feet deep are being bored in downtown streets here in an attempt to discover the location of the foundations of old Fort Pitt, stronghold during the French and alidian war.

WPA workers will dig at six different spots in a project sponsored by the city of Pittsburgh and aided by an archeologist, Homer Wadsworth, secretary of the Point Park commission, announced.

The commission is conducting an initial survey prior to a restoration of the old fort, which would be the central feature of a projected "Point Park." The park would be established and maintained under the national park service.

Halibut Hooks For England

Denver, U.S.—The largest company of its kind in the United States is hard at work on a lend-lease project—sixty million fish hooks.

As fast as the cadmium-coated hooks are finished they are being shipped to Iceland so Britains may continue to have their cod and halibut as they did before the war.

The office of production management readily gave the company a priorities rating that enabled it to get the steel needed for the millions of barbed hooks.

Because of the war, Britain's fishing fleet has been unable to operate extensively enough to supply the nation with fish and the English have turned to Iceland for the staple item.

A. D. McGill, a partner in the firm which makes more fish hooks than any other concern in the nation, estimates nine months will be needed to fill the order.

Hook Without Eye
Instead of an eye, the two and one-half inch hooks have a flattened end which the Icelandic fisherman fastens to his trot lines, McGill said. Each line carries about 1,000 hooks spaced 10 feet apart.

The hook is formed and canted and the barb cut and ground in one operation. Another machine flattens the end and the steel wire then is tempered by an electrical process. Electro-plated with cadmium, the completed hooks are corrosion- and rust-proof.

Besides the 60,000,000 hooks it is making for Iceland, the company is filling orders for emergency kits on war planes, naval ships and merchant marine boats. Each life-boat on every American ship is being fitted with a supply of fish hooks. It is possible for men to live on fish alone for several months, McGill explained.
