Miss Margaret Ireland, Bend high school English instructor, left yesterday for Corvallis, where she will spend part of the spring vacation with her mother.

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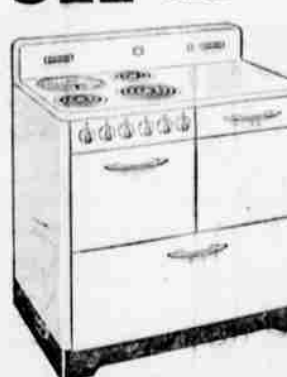

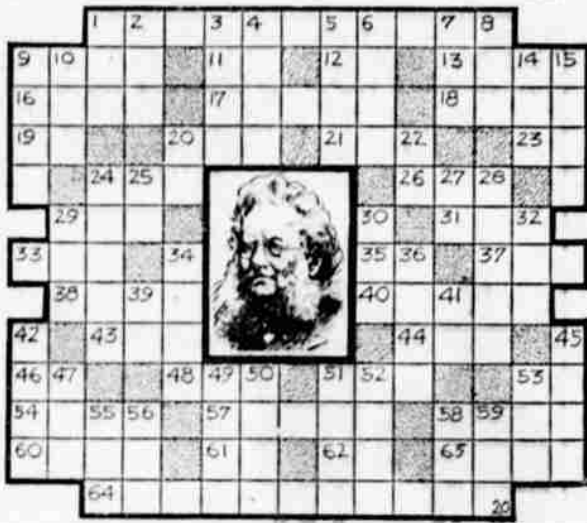

During this part of the journey, MacArthur and his party were rocking along at perhaps 60 miles or better, the motors of their craft roaring wide open.

"We planned to spend the first daylight period at a hideaway in Mindanao island south of Luzon," Gen. Casey explained, "but the mishap to one of the boats disrupted the schedule."

Slight Jap Warship
Then came the crisis moment of the entire voyage, when a Japanese destroyer was sighted.

"It was just at dusk on the second night," Casey said.

"We sighted the destroyer on the horizon but we were small and low-lying and it did not see us."

"We halted until the destroyer had passed and then crossed its wake."

"Near the end of the second night, just before dawn, we reached a secret island rendezvous where two planes brought us on to Australia. Then we took the train."

The boats stopped at American-held relay points in the islands.

Useless to Japs
Gen. Casey emphasized 60 per cent of the Philippines are still in American hands.

"Our three forts—Drum, Mills and Frank—still command Manila bay, and the bay is useless to the Japs until the forts are overcome."

"We still hold Cebu, Panay, Mindanao and countless other islands."

"The Japanese generally have the Filipino population in their hands."

"We found the Japs good guerrilla fighters. They fight to a finish because they are prepared to die. They consider it a disgrace to be captured. Hence we are taking few Jap prisoners."

Other officers who made the trip said that the food situation in the Philippines was "fairly O. K."

Frozen and Dehydrated Foods Better Army Diet
Austin, Tex. (AP)—New quick-freezing and dehydration processes for food are going to make the diet for this war's American soldiers better than it was for the doughboys of 1918.

That's the word of Luis Bartlett, University of Texas engineer and inventor of a process for dehydrating sweet potatoes.

"Especially at training camps it is practical to use dried foods," said Bartlett. "It solves a transportation problem and releases tin cans for where they are needed—at the front."

Some concentrated, dehydrated foods such as yams might be used by men at the front. Frozen foods generally are most suited for serving to soldiers behind the lines.

Bartlett and his assistants are increasing research on preserving carrots and other vegetables in palatable, dehydrated form.

Civilian Defense and Red Cross News

One of the main points of the Oregon civilian defense program is the fact that it starts with the state chairman and coordinator, widens into a state council, branches into similarly organized groups in each county and finally touches each individual in the state. The air raid warden system is similar to this, in that, by the time training has been completed, each person will have an understanding of civilian defense, it is pointed out by Coordinator George Simerville.

In the city of Bend D. Ray Miller, is chief of all wardens' activities. Working with him are senior and junior wardens from each precinct, who in turn have enlisted a warden for each block. It is the duty of the block warden to train the residents of his block in the principles of civilian defense.

As official civilian defense representatives, the block wardens are empowered to give instructions to dwellers in their block, to tell them to turn off lights during a blackout and to answer questions.

Within the next few weeks these block wardens will visit every home in Bend, to deliver the Oregon state defense council official manual of air raid instructions, now being printed. Bend residents are asked by local defense officials to cooperate fully with all air raid wardens.

This column will start today to print by precinct the names and addresses of all air raid wardens in the city. Since the lists were compiled several weeks ago, there is a possibility that some names have been omitted. Wardens whose names are not included on this list are asked to turn in their names, addresses and precincts to Coordinator George Simerville.

All senior wardens are requested to give to Ray Miller the complete list of their junior and block wardens, with their addresses, so that they may be published in The Bulletin.

Volunteers in the aircraft warning service living east of the Cascades have been released for the present, and are asked to serve in other civilian defense activities, it is announced in a bulletin from the state defense council.

The fourth interceptor command does not feel that there is a need right now for the personnel of the warning service, but the chief observer is being retained on duty to check on communication lines to projected observation posts, and to be ready to handle re-enrollment of observers to man them on notice from the inter-

ceptor command. Notice of from four to six weeks will be given the new-released aircraft warning service volunteers, should they be needed for active service.

All members of the Junior Women's club have successfully completed an advanced Red Cross first aid course, it was announced today by the instructor, Miss Mae Goughler. The official first aid cards for these members will be sent from San Francisco headquarters to the Deschutes county Red Cross office in the court-house. Arrival of the cards will be announced in this column.

The regular meeting of the Bend first aid unit slated for Tuesday, March 23, has been postponed to Tuesday, March 30, because of the spring school vacation. At the March 30 meeting Eugene V. Clarke, Bend high school instructor, will bring his high school first aid team to demonstrate artificial respiration. Dr. F. A. Llewellyn will discuss and demonstrate roller bandages at the session.

A. D. Hicks, of San Francisco, field representative of the American Red Cross, will be in Bend from March 30 to April 4 to give an instructors' course in first aid, it was announced today by Mrs. K. Nelson, county first aid chairman.

The 15-hour course will be taught for three hours a night during Hicks' five nights in Bend. All instructors who have not taught a class in the past year must attend this course if they plan to teach first aid—and qualified instructors are desperately needed, said Mrs. Nelson. Any other instructors are invited to attend the classes for a refresher course. Registrations will be made through Mrs. Dan P. Dacey, executive secretary, phone 467, before noon of Saturday, March 28.

Senator Claude Pepper, D., Fla., outspoken pre-war interventionist, today demanded conscription of every man, woman and child in the United States, "so the entire nation will be engaged in all-out war."

Private funeral services are planned for Dr. Clinton Hart Merriam, 86, famed naturalist and one of the founders of the National Geographic society, who died at Berkeley, Calif., yesterday.

Australian Army Minister Francis Forde told Melbourne newsmen that the arrival of such a distinguished soldier as Gen. Douglas MacArthur would have a profound effect on the people of his country.

Indian Farmers War on Axis

L'Anse, Mich. (AP)—A thousand Chippewa Indians are going on the warpath again—only this time with hoes, spades, fertilizer and government-owned tractors.

The Indians, members of the L'Anse reservation and the larger Keweenaw bay Indian community, have issued their own declaration of war against the axis.

Eligible braves plan to enter the actual armed services, but other members of the reservation have pledged themselves to "do their fighting against weeds, cutworms and potato bugs."

The action was given the tribe's official stamp at a recent meeting when Chief Alex Fordia, 80-year-old tribal patriarch, sounded the "call to battle" and Herbert Welch, grandson of the famed Sitting Bull, led an Indian orchestra in "God Bless America."

Proud of Airman in Hawaii
During the ceremonies, Eugene J. Warren, Indian agent here, told the tribe the government had bought an additional 2,500 acres of land and allocated \$6,000 for fertilizer, seeds and equipment.
