

Dodgers Riding National League Crest Once More

Sports Experts Wonder If Bums Are Not More Formidable Than Rated

New York, April 21 (AP)—Along the baseball front today the two important questions under discussion were—

- (1) Are the Brooklyn Dodgers more formidable than rated?
- (2) Can the Boston Red Sox give the Yankees a battle?

After a week of play the Dodgers are riding the National League crest again and their ace of aces, Whit Wyatt, hasn't been out of the starter's gate.

Meantime the Dodgers are rocking along at a merry 714 clip. True they have been bowling over second division opposition, Giants, Phils and Braves, but they are putting the pressure on the Cardinals, Reds and other contenders early.

Yanks Get Fright
The Red Sox threw a fright into the Yanks over the weekend by taking a series from the champions at Yankee stadium. They had six pitchers in a row go for the route—almost unheard of for the Red Sox—but yesterday Joe Dobson, who hurled a six-hitter in his first start, was plastered out of the box by the supposedly weak-hitting Senators.

Nevertheless, the Red Sox still lead the American league and have shown enough all-round strength to make Manager Joe McCarthy consider shaking up the Yankee lineup.

Jack Wilson, an old Red Sox hand, exacted revenge on his former teammates yesterday when he hurled Washington to a 10-4 triumph over Boston.

Rookie Comes Through
Rookie Harry Skitchley's first inning double with two mates on enabled the White Sox to defeat the Tigers, 3-1.

Cleveland rode to a 4-3 victory over the Browns on the hitting of rookie outfielder Oris Hockett, who singled, doubled and tripled.

With Kirby Higbe winning his first game, the Dodgers thumped the Braves, 9-2. Higbe gave up seven hits.

Scoring six runs in the eighth off Max Butcher and Hank Gornicki, the Chicago Cubs waylaid the Pirates, 8-2.

A homer by Alban Glossop, Giant castoff, with the bases loaded enabled the Phils to down the Giants, 6-3.

Rimrock Riders Sign for Guard

Warren Named Webfoot Coach

Eugene, Ore., April 21 (AP)—John A. Warren, freshman coach at the University of Oregon for seven years, today was named head football coach, replacing Tex Oliver and his successor for three days, Vaughn Corley. Both Oliver and Corley had received naval commissions.

Warren was selected by a unanimous decision of the Oregon athletic board last night.

Warren was graduated from Oregon in 1928 after starring at tackle. He coached at Astoria high school from graduation until called "home" to Oregon in 1936, and while there established a sensational record.

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Anglers' Luck First Week Fair

The opening of fishing season proved about average agreed local angling experts today after viewing the results of the first three days of the season.

Suttle lake proved no exception to other years and many fishermen there were rewarded with limit catches of bluebacks, while a few hit the jackpot and hooked onto one of the larger rainbow or eastern brook trout. The largest of these, an 11 pound, eight ounce beauty taken by a Sweet Home man, was caught on Saturday.

This fish, an eastern brook with a 29-inch keel, was brought to Bend Saturday afternoon, entered in the Evans Fly company contest and weighed and affidavit for national competition.

In the Deschutes river results varied directly with the skill of the fisherman it seemed. The native fishermen who know the river seemed to have average luck, but admitted they worked a little harder this year for their catches.

Several limits were taken above Bend and a number of the fish were over 20 inches.

In Bend itself, where scores of youngsters and a few adults have been flocking to Mirror pond for three days now, catches are good. Most of the youngsters take home enough fish for the family. Most popular spots with the youngsters seem to be Hosh point in Drake park and the Drake park foot-bridge, where a city ordinance says there shall be "no fishing."

Few of the experts had any luck with flies and were willing to wait until after a "week of warm weather," as they put it, before they give fly fishing its real test. Catches on the upper river were being made on flatfish or spinners, with either eggs or night crawlers for bait.

Bob Montgomery Wins From Battling Peralta

Philadelphia, April 21 (AP)—Bob Montgomery, local negro lightweight title contender, won a 10-round decision over Joe Peralta, flashy Mexican, last night in a desultory bout.

Montgomery had no difficulty with Peralta but failed to display any of his usual slashing attack.

Many Sign Up For Bend Relays

The largest list of entrants for the Bend relays since the event was started several years ago was in sight today, with seven schools indicating they will have teams here for the competition this Friday evening.

Besides the usual entries—Klamath Falls, Redmond, Lapine, and Bend—Salem, Hood River and Lakeview have sent in entries.

These latest entries assure fans of "red hot" competition in several events. Bend was nosed out by Salem at the Hayward relays a week ago Friday in both the mile and two-mile relays. Individual duels resulting from those races are expected on the Bend track Friday.

Another event which will draw attention is the appearance of three of the state's best high jumpers, Barbour, of Salem, Samuels of Hood River, and Youngberg of Bend, all of whom have reached five feet, ten inches in competition this year, will leap.

High hurdles will pit Samuels of Hood River and Bibby of Salem, two of the best men in that event in the state.

Distance men will be Ballard of Bend, who ranks among the best in the state and Runyan of Salem and Berry of Lakeview. Both of these men hold wins over Ballard, however; both of them beat him on other tracks.

Wilson, Redmond's ace sprinter, is expected to be hard to beat in the short races.

Alsab Favored to Win in Louisville

Louisville, Ky., April 21 (AP)—Unpredictable Alsab—who hasn't won a race since last November—was scheduled to arrive on the scene of the Kentucky derby today, heavily favored by sports writers and the nation's future book operators to win the 68th running of the Blue Grass country's biggest race.

The 1941 juvenile champion took his sixth defeat of the 1942 season on Saturday at Havre de Grace but a semi-final callover in the betting established him as a solid favorite at 4-1 for the \$75,000 classic to be run May 2.
