Sheepmen have been ordered to move their flocks from the 800,000 acres selected for the southeast Oregon gunnery range...

The vast acreage will be available for army fliers not only from two Oregon bases, but from several adjacent states.

The southeastern Oregon range, now practically ready for use, is in the Owyhee river, Steens mountain, Folly farm and Andrews region.

This range will be available for use annually from about April 15 to October 1. The Central Oregon range will be required from July 1 to March 15.

Pacific Council Of War Meets, Studies Problem

Better Use of Allied Shipping Is Declared Essential at Present

Washington, April 21 (AP)—The Pacific war council met today and was to consider the need for better use of United Nations shipping.

That need was cited by Harry L. Hopkins after his return from London. The council is scheduled to meet with President Roosevelt and it was assumed that some of the results of Hopkins' recent mission to Great Britain with Gen. George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, would be studied.

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Women Now Needed "The tough business of making war" involves more efficient use of allied shipping and the placement of many more women in American war industries, Hopkins told reporters yesterday.

Hopkins' views, particularly concerning shipping, coincided with official advice that shipment of war aid to the Soviet Union is increasing steadily. April exports were expected to far surpass those of any previous month.

The amount of aid sent to Russia in March was two and a half times as great as that sent in February from this country.

The comments of Hopkins were regarded as particularly significant because he is perhaps the closest official in Washington to the chief executive and Roosevelt thoroughly respects his opinions.

Many Matters Studied Hopkins said while in London he took up "a dozen and one things that related to the waging of war—the building of ships, the use of ships and the whole question of supplies or our two nations and to the United Nations, coordinating it particularly as it applies to Russia, China and Australia."

The coordination of this far-flung supply program, he added, "involves a vast amount of shipping and requires the real pooling of the ships that the United Nations now own."

Chief of Staff Back in States

Washington, April 21 (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, today was expected to begin important conferences on war strategy with President Roosevelt and other high military leaders.

He and Harry L. Hopkins returned from a confidential mission to London yesterday. Hopkins remained in New York temporarily but Marshall and the four British representatives who reportedly accompanied him flew immediately to Washington.

The Marshall-Hopkins mission was widely interpreted as a step in plans for opening a second front in Europe this spring or summer.

The four Britishers said to have accompanied Marshall and Hopkins on the return trip were understood to include one of very high rank. The others were believed to be naval officers.
