Washington, April 21 (AP)—War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson said today the government may have to draft war production executives because congressional criticism is making experienced businessmen reluctant to volunteer their services.

"We may have to have a form of organization that will draft men for these particular jobs," Nelson told the senate committee investigating the war program.

Businessmen find themselves subjected to a barrage of criticism when they accept positions in the war production setup, he charged. Much of this criticism, he added, seems to be based solely on the fact that they are businessmen.

Confraternity To Meet Here

Hundreds of delegates from the southern and central portion of the state, including Klamath Falls, Merrill, Chilcoquin, Baker, Prineville and Redmond, will assemble here for the seventh annual convention of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, to be held on Thursday, April 23. The convention will be held at the Liberty theater. Registration will start at 9:30 a. m. on that day and the first session will be set in motion by Most Rev. Joseph F. McGrath, D.D. bishop of the diocese of Baker City.

The keynote address will be given by Father Scott, of Klamath Falls. The theme of the convention will be the problems of youth. Mrs. J. F. Arnold, of the local unit of the confraternity, will be the general chairman for the proceedings. Robert LeBlanc will be the chairman for the youth sessions. All of the sessions will be open to the public.

Oregon Warned To Be on Alert

Salem, April 21 (AP)—Governor Charles A. Sprague cautioned civilian defense units in Oregon today to be on the alert against the possibility of Japanese reprisals following reported allied bombing raids on Japanese cities.

"If our planes are able to reach Tokyo and other Jap cities," the governor said, "it certainly is possible for the Japs to reach the western coast of our country. Oregon and Washington are in the front line."

"Prison raids may be expected and everyone should be prepared. Danger of fires, both in cities and in forests, is great and I strongly urge all citizens to be on the alert at all times."

Sprague warned that all persons must be acquainted with their roles in an emergency and asked those Oregonians who have not received their air raid instruction booklets to contact defense council offices as once to obtain them.

Campaign Will Be "Poor Man's"

Chicago, April 21 (AP)—Chairman Joseph W. Martin of the republican national committee said today that the GOP would conduct a "poor man's campaign" in next fall's elections because "conditions do not warrant the expenditure of huge sums for political purposes."

At a press conference, Martin said the GOP was "never better off financially in an off-year than it is now." In contrast to a debt of about \$1,500,000 in 1937, the party now owes, at the most \$10,000, Martin said.

Military Pilot Training Sought

Washington, April 21 (AP)—A program to enroll college students for eventual service as military pilots was announced today by Lieut. Gen. Henry H. Arnold, commander of the army air force.

Arnold said, "the successful prosecution of this war demands the creation of an air force second to none on earth, and this in turn requires the eventual enlistment as an aviation cadet of every young man who can qualify."

Under the new program college and university students will be recruited as privates in the air force enlisted reserve, serving without pay. They will be subject to call for active duty at any time, entering service as aviation cadets.

Arnold said, however, that many students, especially those taking meteorology or communications courses, will be allowed to finish their training to qualify as officers.

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War Order Limits Telephone Installations

To conserve further the materials essential to the war effort, the War Production Board has ordered the telephone industry to limit installations of both subscribers' and central office equipment as well as cables and wire lines.

Subject to future orders by the War Production Board, telephones now in service will not be affected unless customers move or desire rearrangements or changes in their existing equipment.

Some of the important restrictions are:

1. EXTENSION TELEPHONES may not be installed in residences unless required for public health, welfare or security.
2. TELEPHONES may not be changed from wall and desk types to handsets.
3. PARTY LINES will be installed where sharing of lines will conserve scarce and critical materials.
4. SWITCHBOARDS in business establishments may not be converted from manual to dial.
