Prado Mission To U.S. Viewed As Significant

President of Peru Is Guest of Roosevelt; Motive Study Is Made

The official visit of President Manuel Prado of Peru to the United States, as a guest of President Roosevelt, is weighted with more significance than is first apparent.

He is the first president of a South American nation to make such a visit, and he has come at a time when the course of smooth and friendly relations between the United States and the neighboring countries to the south is of paramount importance to this country.

Peru has been meticulous in compliance with its international obligations, and its government has shown an exemplary spirit of friendship and full cooperation with the United States in hemisphere defense. Its foreign minister, Dr. Alfredo Sol y Muro, heading the Peruvian delegation to the conference of American Foreign Ministers at Rio de Janeiro, supported the democratic anti-axis front there, and he was one of the leaders in the move to recommend severance of relations with the axis.

Produces Cotton, Copper Peru lost little time in breaking off relations, once the resolution was adopted by the conference, and then moved swiftly at home to place under rigid control the activities of all active and potential fifth columnists and plotters of subversive movements.

Peru's importance as a purveyor of essential strategic war materials can not be minimized. It is one of the world's great copper and cotton producers, and its great petroleum deposits are of extreme value, especially to neighboring South American countries, such as Chile, whose normal supplies from the United States are jeopardized by shipping shortages.

Trade Reciprocity A fortnight before Prado's arrival, the United States reached an agreement with Peru to buy a large quantity of long-staple cotton and to finance Peruvian rubber development. Coincident with Prado's arrival in Washington came the announcement of the signing of a reciprocal trade pact with Peru, negotiated by David Dasso, the Peruvian foreign minister.

Dr. Prado is spending a large part of his time in this country outside of Washington. The program of his tour includes visits to United States cities that are the centers of the swiftly growing war industry.

The impression that President Prado will receive of the American war effort is certain to be a marked one. He will not only have had an opportunity to view the wheels of United States industry in motion, but will have been given more than a glimpse of American military manpower in his visits to such centers as West Point, Annapolis and other places where the army and navy are training leaders in an all out effort against the axis.

Expect More Visits Other heads of South American states may shortly make similar visits to this country. President Carlos Arroyo de Rio de Ecuador is already understood to have received an invitation from President Roosevelt. Dr. Alfonso Lopez, the newly-elected president of Colombia for the 1942-1946 term, may visit the United States on a pre-inauguration tour, according to government circles in Bogota.

President Getulio Vargas of Brazil has long held an invitation from President Roosevelt to come to the United States. A visit from Dr. Vargas would be extremely popular, but there seems little likelihood that the Brazilian chief executive will be able to leave his country at this time. Brazil's geo-

Many Potatoes Are Shipped Out

Redmond, May 21.—One hundred nineteen cars of Deschutes netted gem potatoes were shipped from this point for the month of April, 1942, said Ben Davidson, federal-state shipping point inspector in charge for this district. Davidson indicated that this is nearly double any other previous year for same month, making a total of 1041 cars for the season to date. The season is practically over here commercially. In 1941 it ended June 13. Fifty-five cars of certified seed went out from this point this year. Approximately 12 cars of certified seed were accompanied by the federal-state shipping point certificate issued by Davidson, making a total of 67 cars of this seed.

No potatoes are to be shipped into this territory, without certification by a plant pathologist of the state. Potatoes from California cannot be accepted here, indicated Davidson.

Potato acreage will be increased approximately 400 acres this year in this section, with the assurance that there will be no labor shortage or difficulty in harvesting the crop, it was said. High school pupils will be available, as they were last fall. The Indians from the Warm Springs Agency are always available for this work.
