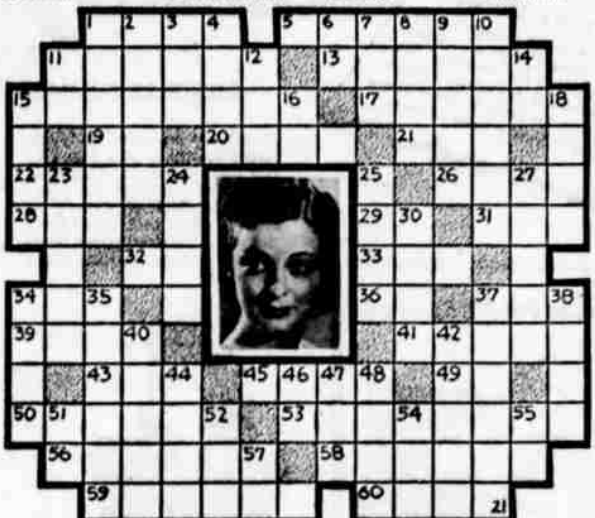

Talk of Peace Aids Markets

New York, May 21 (AP)—Increasing talk in financial quarters of the possibility of an early peace brought aggressive strength into the stock market today, generated heavy demand for bonds of those countries occupied by Germany and precipitated selling in commodities.

Heavy demand came into the so-called peace shares and they rose

fractions to more than 2 points in the most active trading since last March 8 when 640,000 shares were turned over on the big board.

Cotton broke about \$1.50 a bale, wool tops futures lost 2 cents a pound, May oats broke the 5-cent per bushel limit, wheat and corn were off almost 2 cents a bushel and soy beans had losses running to almost 3 cents a bushel.
