Joe Gordon Pounds Out Two Home Runs in One Game; Cincinnati Wins

New York, May 21 (AP)—World series talk subsided somewhat in Flatbush today.

The boys at Flynn's around the corner from Ebbets field agreed that maybe it was rushing matters a little to start comparing the Dodgers to the Yankees this early after all. Not that the boys are afraid the Bums won't keep the pennant in Brooklyn (shun, don't mention such a thing if you expect to ever go back to the land of the lawns canal.)

But the Cooper boys of old St. Louis whittled the Dodgers right down to normal stature yesterday while 1,843 pop-eyed fans sat amazed that such a thing could happen. The Brooklyn pennant express which had won eight straight was careening along at the swiftest pace in Dodger history when the switch was thrown on it by the big raw-boned Cooper boys.

Ball Might Fast

Morton threw a baseball past the Dodgers so fast it looked like an aspirin tablet. His battery-mate and brother, Walker, hit a line drive triple and scored the only run in the Cardinals' 1-0 triumph over the league-leaders. Mort, who has been staking some claims to the title of the league's hardest luck hurler, never picked a better spot to hurl a master-throw.

He gave up two singles—one to Meshick and one to Herman—and only four men reached first. None got any farther. He walked one man and the other got there on a fielder's choice.

Cooper's mound rival was Whit Wyatt, who pitched well enough to win almost any game. He gave up four hits but one was Walker Cooper's blazing triple to the exit gate in center field. Cooper scored on Creepy Crespil's fly to center.

Lead Is Trimmed
The Dodger defeat trimmed their league lead to six games over the Boston Braves and to six and a half games over the Cardinals, who have now run off four straight.

The Yankees made sure of their American league lead by cooling off the White Sox, 4-1, and snapping Chicago's seven-game winning streak.

Seattle, May 21 (AP)—University of Washington's undefeated track and field team, already winner of the northern division dual meet title, sharpened its spikes today in readiness for the division open championship meet at Seattle next Saturday.

Winner over Oregon State and Washington State in dual meets, the Husky squad is the only unbeaten team entered.

Last week's conference schedule was painted with upsets. The University of Montana fooled the seers by coming from behind to beat Idaho at Missoula in the relay, last event on the program. Too, Oregon's 80 to 51 point victory over Oregon State was a surprise.

W. S. C. Looses Pair
Washington State college has lost two dual meets this season but such stalwarts as Pat Haley, hurdler; Noel Williams, Pacific Coast conference two-mile champion, and Frank Londo, defending shotput champion, makes W. S. C. a strong contender in the division meet.

Washington Coach C. S. "Hee" Edmundson said today he intended to enter 18 men in the meet.

"My boys are in pretty fair shape and should do well in the 220, the half mile and relay," Edmundson said.

Thomas, University of Oregon's pole-vaulter, has scaled 13 feet 6 inches.

Butler in the sprints and hurdle events and Wilson, Oregon's two-miler who jogs the long haul in less than 9:50 should put the Webfoots in the points counting business.

Oregon State college has Findley in the high jump; Fischer in the mile, Blair in the 440; Frakes in the pole-vault, and Flaker in the two-mile to carry its hopes.

University of Idaho has outstanding men in shot and discus—Bell and Milo Anderson—and consistent performers in the distance grinds who should gather points.

Clawson of Montana, top-flight discus thrower of the circuit this season, has lobbed the skimmer more than 135 feet.

In short, the remarkably well distributed individual strength divided among the contending teams could mean a helter-skelter point splitting afternoon and a whopping upset.
