New York, July 21 (UP)—Stocks registered small gains in most major groups today with volume heavier than yesterday's dull turnover, while a few special issues advanced as much as 1/2 points in Gotham. Hosiery preferred, which made a new high for the year.

Steels were firmer and coppers about steady. The stocks firm and several made new highs. Motors were steady to firm and mercantiles firm. Rails were better in most instances, building stocks mixed and airlines up fractions to a point. Enough utilities eased to bring the average down slightly.

Bethlehem Steel held at 54 up 1/4 through most of the session. U. S. Steel touched 50 up 1/4. Anaconda and Kennecott had minor declines while International Nickel firmed.

Santa Fe made a new high and then encountered profit-taking which reduced its gain. Atlantic Coast line at its high of 25 1/4 was up 1/4. Gains of a point and more were made by Carolina, Clinchfield & Ohio, Northern Central and Texas & Pacific.

Allied Chemical rose two points. American Airlines gained a point. Smaller advances were noted in Eastern Air Lines and United Air Lines. Aircraft issues generally were better.

Old Oregon Guns To Remain Silent

Portland, July 21 (UP)—The once-mighty guns of the old battleship Oregon, which blasted the Spanish fleet at Santiago De Cuba, will never sound again.

If the Oregon goes to sea in world war II, it will be as part of a new aircraft carrier.

That was the navy's decision today, as reported to Gov. Charles A. Sprague. The governor disclosed last week the WPB was seeking use of the scrap metal in the venerable battleship's hull.

Although Sprague and the Battleship Oregon commission agreed that such a request would be heeded, they advanced the forlorn hope that the Oregon might be converted into an aircraft carrier without being dismantled.

The navy department was polite but firm. "Too little and too late," said the navy, but "too old and too short."

Loan on Barley Held Important

Redmond, July 21—No eligible county producer need accept a price of less than 85 per cent of parity for his barley, wheat or rye this year, regardless of the market price, reminds the Deschutes county AAA committee, in announcing 1942 loan rates on these crops in this county.

The barley loan is especially important this year. Because of the unusually large crop in prospect, current market quotations are relatively low, and contracts to purchase the coming crop are being offered growers at prices considerably below the 1942 loan value.

Full information relative to prices can be obtained from the office of the county agent in Redmond or from members of the county AAA committee.

Yearly Payment Plan Is Provided

It was stated in a story in The Bulletin yesterday in connection with two state checks received here by County Treasurer R. A. Ferguson, that the balance of the road bonds amounts to \$8,000, after a payment is made in November of \$3,000, to be paid off in two payments of \$4,000 each in 1943 and 1944.

Ferguson announced today that the \$8,000 will be paid off instead in the following payments: \$3,000 in 1943; \$3,000 in 1944 and \$2,000 in 1945.

The November payment of \$3,000 and interest of \$288.75 will be paid out of a check of \$14,466.52, which was received yesterday by the treasurer from the state motor vehicle license fund.

Ads to Assist Salvage Flow

Washington, July 21—final details of the nationwide advertising campaign designed to help stimulate the flow of scrap metal into war production, were approved recently by Lessing J. Rosenwald, chief of the conservation division.

Rosenwald's approval followed conferences with members of the American industries salvage committee, sponsors of the \$2,000,000 campaign. The committee, made up of representatives of American industries, was organized by the suggestion of the conservation division. The committee has raised the fund to finance the campaign and is responsible for the selection of the advertising and publicity mediums used.

"This campaign," said Rosenwald, "was undertaken by a group of the nation's leading industries, at the request of the conservation division of WPB, and is closely integrated with WPB's new national salvage program. The committee includes member companies of the American iron and steel institute, which is concerned with assuring a continual flow of scrap metal into its plants, but is also using its ads to stimulate the flow of other needed materials. The immediate response of industry in setting up machinery for the campaign was particularly gratifying, in so far as it helped up to clear the tracks for an all-out drive to bring in the scrap."

Stalingrad on the Volga. The two axis offensives, probably supplemented by a third push along the railroad from Lohkaya toward Stalingrad, are of equal importance in the battle for the Caucasus.

Oil Fields Goal

The present phase of fighting may well determine possession of the main oil supplies of the soviet union. The Russians have strong defenses along the northern end of the Caspian coastal fields to Rostov and then northward to Nikitovka, forcing the enemy to detour around the line en route to Rostov. The line north of Rostov, however, is now rendered useless by the German flanking advances, or it may have been seized at some points after being destroyed by the Russians.

Dispatches pointed out that the Germans have probably one-third of their strength on the eastern front at present and that Hitler would not be forced to withdraw important forces unless a big scale invasion were attempted by the allies. A smaller or diversionary invasion attack would not only be in much greater danger of failing but would have slight effect in forcing withdrawal of enemy power from the Russian front.

The royal air force continued attacking attacks against the enemy from Le Havre on the French coast to northwest Germany. The British admiralty said that light naval forces had fought a strong force of enemy armed trawlers off Cape Griz Nez in the English channel, where one German trawler was set afire and a supply ship heavily damaged. A British motor gunboat was lost, but the enemy convoy was turned back.

WRIST INJURED

Russell Gribkov, forest lookout at Big Hole butte, slashed his wrist with an axe Sunday morning and was brought to Bend where several stitches were necessary to close the wound. Gribkov expects to return to work Wednesday.

Missing Cards Were Not "Lost"

The cards of 33 young men who registered for selective service at the courthouse late in June were not missing at any time, it was reported today by the selective service office and the county clerk.

The cards were not needed by the selective service board until last night and would have been picked up by the board before that time, it was stated at the selective service office.

One of the cards was needed Saturday to check the release of Sam Peoples who is enlisting in the air corps and the cards were taken to the selective service office from the county clerk's office at that time.

"The cards were never missing and were in the safe all the time marked selective service," Miss Mable Livesay, county clerk, said today. "I was waiting for the draft board to call for them for their July 20 meeting and if they hadn't come by that time I would have called them about it. I went to the office Saturday afternoon and unlocked the safe so Mrs. Mary Ray from the draft office could get them."

The entire group of registration cards were checked by the selective service board last night, as provided by selective service regulations, and were being given serial numbers today. The cards are being arranged in order of age and the oldest registrant in the group will be number one. If two or more of the registrants have birthdays on the same day, their cards will be arranged alphabetically before being numbered.

No lottery is being held on the fifth registration, the order of call to service being determined by the age of the registrants.

War Labor Board Studies Dispute

Washington, July 21 (UP)—Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins has certified to the war labor board a dispute between the Pine Industries Relations Committee, Inc., Klamath Falls, Ore., and the International Woodworkers of America (CIO).

The dispute involves 4,500 workers in 15 firms and the union is demanding union security. Miss Perkins also certified a controversy between the Washington Metal Trades, Inc., Seattle, Wash., and five AFL unions over wages. Forty shops and 2,000 workers are affected.

Civilian Defense and Red Cross News

With the recognition of the citizens' service corps of volunteers in community war services by the office of civilian defense as well as the protective division under the citizens' defense corps, the need for a civilian defense volunteer office in every county or large community becomes of primary importance. The volunteer office is the practical instrument for mobilizing civilian effort in support of the war program and is the official arm of a defense council, serving as the clearing house for all volunteers and volunteer work.

The volunteer office does the following: 1—It maintains an office where civilians can go to find out where their services are needed and where their training and experience will be most useful; the training required for specific services; the hours and duties involved in various kinds of volunteer work; requirements for membership in either the citizens' defense corps or the citizens service corps.

2—It recruits, classifies and registers volunteers and refers them to the protective services where they may become eligible for the citizens defense corps or to community war services where they may become eligible for the citizens service corps.

3—It keeps a complete and current inventory of all volunteer opportunities in civilian defense.

4—It keeps a central classified file of all volunteers which shows those working according to specific assignments; those in training; those awaiting training or assignment. The names of volunteers enrolled in Red Cross activities are to be included in the file in accordance with the agreement of the national offices of the American Red Cross and the office of civilian defense.

5—It sees that adequate training courses are established for the citizens service corps. This is done by consulting with and aiding the agencies which use or plan to use volunteers in war work.

6—It confers with the chairmen of all committees of the defense council and with all community agencies to stimulate their use of volunteers and their use of the volunteer office.

7—In cooperation with the heads of the protective division and community war services it controls and records the issuance of insignia through the central office file. Its records should be the basis for accurate certification to membership in the citizens defense corps and the citizens' service corps. Such personnel records as are now being kept in the office of the county coordinator should be turned over to the volunteer office.

8—It cooperates with public information agencies to keep alive interest in volunteer service for the war. It recognizes that recruitment of volunteers is a continuous process. In larger cities it

keeps a trained staff on duty throughout the day. It locates its offices in quarters convenient for public use and establishes as many branches as may be necessary.

The civilian defense volunteer office committee should include men and women from civic and patriotic organizations, public and private social agencies, welfare or community council personnel, neighborhood clubs, labor youth, veteran, church and school groups. It is well to include an expert on office routine and filing systems.

George Simerville, coordinator, said today that the volunteer plan is a splendid one. He urges persons in Bend, who are interested in it, to report to him in the city hall regarding a plan to organize. More information regarding the volunteer plan will be released soon, Simerville said.
