

Dodger's Wyatt Holds Giants To Single Hit

"Rock of Chickamauga" Now One of Brooklyn's Most Valuable Hurlers

New York, Aug. 21 (AP)—Veteran Whitlow Wyatt, the "rock of Chickamauga" was just a pebble in the path of the Yankees in the last world series. But if his current pitching is any indication, he may prove to be an irresistible force should the Dodgers play the New Yorkers again in the October classic.

The 32-year-old Georgia horn righthander had kicked around in organized baseball from 1928 to 1938, when he was called to Brooklyn from Milwaukee after winning 23 games.

Now Valuable Player

Since then he has become increasingly valuable to the Dodgers, especially last season when he won 22 games to lead the National league. Yet, at no time was his worth more clearly demonstrated than when he held the Giants to one hit to bring Brooklyn a 2-1 triumph at Ebbets field yesterday.

Wyatt missed the pitchers' hall of fame by the margin of Johnny Mize's homer as the Dodgers edged the Giants in the opener of a four-game series. The blow came in the second inning and was the 20th for Long John. The victory gave Wyatt 15 victories against only four defeats.

Cincinnati broke a six-game losing streak with a 5-3 victory over the Pirates in the only other National league game scheduled. Johnny Vander Meer pitched his 14th victory as he held the Pirates to six hits.

Tablar Gets Homer

Jim Tablar's third homer in two days, this one with two on, clinaxed a six-run rally in the fifth inning that enabled the Red Sox to whip the Yankees, 7-4, and take the series, three games to four. The Boston victory trimmed the top-heavy American league lead of the Yanks to 10 1/2 games.

Philadelphia trampled Washington twice, 9-2, and 6-1. The nightcap went 12 innings before the A's, who garnered 18 hits, clicked for five runs to score a clean sweep.

The White Sox slammed a brace of pitchers for six runs in the fifth inning to coast to an 8-5 victory over the Browns in a night game at Chicago.

Elk Season "Out" For Coast Points

Portland, Aug. 21 (AP)—A ruling, closing the special elk hunting season in Coos and Douglas counties, went into effect today following an order of the state game commission, meeting in extraordinary session, late yesterday.

The season was to have extended from Aug. 23-31, inclusive.

The commission announced the order was in accord with a request of Lt. Gen. John L. DeWitt, chief of the western defense command, who had asked that the region be closed to decrease fire hazards.

Hunting records show more than 1,000 hunters will be affected by the emergency closure.

A proposal by Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, that "some method be worked out to refund license fees to individual hunters" was considered briefly by the commission but was not acted upon.

Wire pointed out the commission owed a "moral obligation" to license purchasers but the commission said the licenses were valid anywhere in the state where the taking of elk was permitted.
