New York, Aug. 21 (AP)—The stock market made a moderate technical advance today on slightly increased turnover. Improvement in the market permitted sale of two blocks of stock as special offerings on the stock exchange. One of them—5,000 shares of Hercules Powder at 59—was sold in six minutes. The other, a 10,000-share block of National Distillers, was oversubscribed by more than 50 per cent. The big sale put National Distillers into number one place in activity. The railroad group furnished several actives and gains in this group ranged to more than a point in Union Pacific which made a new high at 80 1/2 on its 7 month earnings report which showed a sharp gain over the corresponding period of last year. Steel issues were up small amounts and the non-ferrous metal issues enjoyed a better market, including the gold mining stocks where Homestake Mining gained 1/2 point.

Padre on Board When Canadians Head for France

Pastor Prays for Men Soon to Make Landing Under Fire of Germans

London, Aug. 21 (AP)—The Padre called the men in the tank-landing boat about him while they still could see the dark English quay behind them. Standing in the bow in front of a tank, he read the sixth chapter of Ephesians, holding his Bible in one hand and a flashlight in the other. There he prayed, the last prayer some aboard would ever hear. Most of the men aboard—they were members of the Calgary Tanks—dropped off to sleep as the boat ploughed on toward Dieppe. Explosions heard. They were awakened just before dawn by rumbling explosions on the French coast. The explosions were of bombs dropped by the royal air force. It was still dark. A red glow crept up and down the coast. The first British commandos were opening the way for us. Suddenly a Verey light went up; it was from the commandos and meant "objective attained—coastal batteries wiped out." Machine gun and artillery on shore roared and chattered, and when daylight came, the batteries started lobbing shells at our boats. Our first landing attempt failed and we waited for orders to go in again at another beach. Four Focke-Wulfs dived at us, but two went down in flames. Again we found it impossible to get to the beach and were ordered to retire. Ship Blasts Objectives. Just then, we saw one of the most gallant sights of the whole action. A British ship sailed almost into the mouth of the Dieppe harbor and lay there 45 minutes blasting away with all guns. Houses crumbled. We could see its shells smashing into German strong points. Casualties had been brought aboard our boat by this time, and a padre of the Montreal Fusiliers told about trying to get on shore with men being killed all around him. A Lieutenant had his arm shot off, and tried to push the padre down to save him from machine gun bullets. Again we tried to get to the beach, but it couldn't be done. Bombs and gunfire drove us out. I was knocked down when a stick of four bombs fell near us, wounding some of our men and killing one. Tanks Get In Fighting. Tanks were still fighting; that could be told by the high, barking cough of their guns. We heard one tank commander say over the radio: "I'm hit and balling out. Wish me luck." He is listed as missing. We picked up a wounded British commando. "The Canadians are taking an awful pounding in there," he said. "They're fighting like hell, but Jerry is awfully strong." Eventually, we were ordered to return to England, but as we withdrew, the roar of battle followed us. We had suffered heavy losses. But no men ever died more bravely than the Canadians. Dieppe may go down in the annals of Canadian military history with Vimy Ridge.

Rubber Thrown at Jap "Kids" Aid to Drive
Santa Monica, Cal. (AP)—The Tokyo Kid spurred both rubber collection and bond sales in this beach community. Created by Jack Campbell, aircraft worker, the Tokyo Kid was a huge Jap face with hinged teeth. Citizens were invited to hurl their rubber at the Jap—and knock his teeth out with a square hit. Framed by such slogans as "Let's Choke the Jap with Rubber Scrap" and "Slap the Jap in the Yawp," the Tokyo Kid leered forth from the Victory house on a downtown Santa Monica street corner.

Army Will Train More Rangers

Washington, Aug. 21 (AP)—The American army rangers who participated in the raid on Dieppe will help train other American forces both in Britain and in this country for bigger missions to come. The rangers who participated in the raid were headed by Brig. Gen. L. K. Truscott, Jr., who is on the staff of Commando Chief Lord Louis Mountbatten's staff. They went along to get experience and training in this type of warfare. Undersecretary of War Robert F. Patterson explained at a press conference today, and their experience now will be put to use in training others. Patterson has indicated that the training given at Helena, Mont., to the first special service force, commanded by Colonel Robert T. Frederick, would be similar to the training of the rangers.

Democrats Name John J. Bennett

New York, Aug. 21 (AP)—Attorney General John J. Bennett was nominated as the democratic candidate for governor of New York Thursday, defeating Sen. James M. Mead, who had been sponsored by President Roosevelt. The final unofficial vote was 622 for Bennett and 394 for Mead. Bennett, the candidate of former Democratic National Chairman James A. Farley, probably will oppose Thomas E. Dewey in November. Dewey virtually is assured of the republican nomination next week. He ran for the governorship four years ago but was defeated by Gov. Herbert H. Lehman.
