

St. Louis Holds To Leadership In League Race

Time, Weather Working Against Dodgers as 2 Teams Battle for Title

New York, Sept. 21 (UP)—Time and the weather, twin bugaboos to any last-ditch, day-by-day pennant race, prevailed today as the two most potent obstacles to the Brooklyn Dodgers National League pennant chase.

There are exactly seven days left on the schedule for 1942 and the Dodgers have a game for each day — four with Philadelphia, two with Boston and one with New York. Should weather prevent the playing of any of the games, the Dodgers might not be able to arrange a re-play and thus miss one of their few chances to overhaul the Redbirds.

St. Louis, in the driver's seat today with a 2½ game margin, has six games and one open date in this last week of play. The Cards will play two contests each with Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and Chicago at home and only have to win four to be assured of a tie. That deadlock would result only if Brooklyn were to win all of its remaining games. Should the Dodgers lose one and the Redbirds win four, it would be enough to clinch the flag for the Cardinals. In other words, the key to the pennant for St. Louis is number "5" — any combination of Cardinal triumphs and Dodger defeats.

Cards Hold Margin
The Cards maintained their margin over the Dodgers yesterday by swapping shutouts with the Cubs. St. Louis came through with a brilliant, 1-0 triumph in the opener when Johnny Hopp raced home in the fourth on a double steal.

Claude Passeau outpitched four St. Louis moundsmen and allowed only five hits to gain his 19th win as the Cubs won the nightcap, 3-0.

The Phils whipped Brooklyn, 7-3, in the opener of their double bill, but the Dodgers drummed out a 4-2 win in the nightcap. A triple by Rookie Johnny Wyrostek off Clyde Shoun with one on in the 13th gave the Pirates a 2-1 triumph over the Reds. The second game was called after seven innings because of the Sunday law, with the score tied at 3-3.

The New York-Boston twin bill was postponed. In the American league, Gerry Priddy batted in both runs as the Yankees won the first game of a double bill from the Red Sox, 2-1. Held to seven hits by Hank Borowick in the nightcap, the Sox scored two in the eighth to win, 3-2, just before the game was called by darkness.

Sox Divide Pair
The White Sox divided with the Browns. Johnny Humphries gave up 12 hits but, helped by four St. Louis errors, gained a 6-5 decision in the opener. Bob Muncie pitched a seven-hitter as the Browns rallied for four runs in the fifth to register a 4-2 decision in the nightcap.

Mel Harder pitched a two-hitter as the Indians defeated the Tigers, 2-0, in the opener of a double bill. But Detroit matched a two-run ninth inning Tribe rally with a pair of their own in their half to eke out a 6-5 decision in the nightcap.

Washington came from behind with seven runs in the ninth to beat out the Athletics, 11-9, in the first game of their double-header. The Mackmen, blanked for eight innings in the nightcap, nicked Bill Zuber for their second run in the 10th to win a 2-1 decision.

Ex-State Stars Aid in Victory

The star-studded Portland Boilermakers loomed as the team to beat today in the Pacific northwest war industries professional football league, following opening games at Portland and Spokane yesterday.

The Boilermakers overpowered the Vancouver, Wash., Warco, 35 to 0, while Spokane upset Seattle, 7-6.

A crowd of 12,000 thronged Portland's Multnomah stadium to see the Boilermakers make full use of a half-dozen Oregon State rose bowl stars and a number of former all-Americans from Oregon, Washington and other western schools.

Operating behind a giant line which at times averaged 240 pounds, and included such standouts as Elmer Kolberg, Leonard Younce, Prescott Hutchins, and Quentin Greenough, ex-O. S. C. Chuck Mucha, and Bob McQueen, University of Washington; Bill Morgan, University of Oregon; and Hank Ramsey, O. S. C. Larry Wolfe's fleet backs raced to 28 points in the first quarter, and then added another touchdown in the fourth.

Bob Dethman and Gene Gray, ex-O. S. C., provided the main scoring punch, aided by Chet Halicki, ex-Oregon, and Dave Teyney, former Portland high school star, who never had played college ball.

In the south, Loyola University of Los Angeles walloped Redlands, 27-0, while Pomona lost to the Los Alamitos naval aviation base, 13 to 7.

Next Saturday, however, it will be a different story and the gridiron menu is packed with punch, with such contests on tap as the California-St. Mary's tussle at Berkeley and the coast conference game between Washington State and Stanford at Palo Alto.
