

Notre Dame's Mentor Named Coach of Week

28-0 Victory Over Iowa Seahawks Wins Award For Edward McKeever

New York, Oct. 21 (AP)—A man with a slow Texas drawl addressed the Notre Dame football squad in its dressing room before last Saturday's game against the Iowa Seahawks.

What he said in his heart-to-heart pep talk is a secret but what his boys did after hearing him is gridiron history. Their 28 to 0 victory over the supposedly invincible Seahawks won for the man the United Press coach of the week award.

His name is Edward Clark Timothy McKeever and he wants it understood that he is only one of five men in the Notre Dame picture.

Modest to a point and a little embarrassed by all the praise bestowed upon him for the Irish successes against Stanford and the Cadets, he said:

"I'm very appreciative of the congratulations directed to me, but people seem to forget that Frank Leahy is the man who prepared this team."

McKeever, the backfield coach, took over when Leahy, the head mentor, had to go to a hospital for treatment. Before that time the Irish, regarded as one of the nation's powerhouses in pre-season forecasts, had been tied by Wisconsin and beaten by Georgia Tech.

A native of San Antonio, Tex., McKeever is 32, married and the father of twin daughters born while he was enroute to the sugar bowl with the Boston college football team in 1940. He is the athletic type—5 feet, 10 inches tall, weighs 178 pounds and has brown, wavy hair. He has a dynamic personality.

Leaves Notre Dame

He played high school football under Jack Meagher, former Notre Dame star now coaching at Auburn, at St. Edward's prep school, Austin, Tex. He matriculated at Notre Dame in 1930 and won freshman numerals. In the fall of 1931 he went out for varsity football and when he found himself fifth string fullback he decided to go to Rice, where Meagher then was coaching.

He arrived too late to enroll, however, and journeyed on to Texas Tech where he played in 1932-33-34 under Pete Cawthon. In his three years the team won 30 out of 35 games.

After graduating he remained at Tech as a member of the coaching staff for four seasons. During the summer of 1938 Leahy lectured at Tech and met McKeever. McKeever made such a strong impression on him that when Leahy was named head coach at Boston college in 1939 he selected McKeever as his backfield coach. When Leahy switched to Notre Dame he took McKeever with him.

For four straight years teams he coached have played in bowl games—Texas Tech in the sun bowl in 1938 and the cotton bowl in 1939 and Boston college in the cotton bowl in 1940 and the sugar bowl in 1941.

Shutout and Alsab to Meet

New York, Oct. 21 (AP)—The three-year-old championship may be decided at Jamaica today when Alsab and Shutout meet for the first time since the Belmont stakes last June.

The brilliant pair of three-year-olds will pick up top weight of 124 pounds as they head a field of eight named for the \$15,000 Galant Fox handicap over a mile and five furlongs route.

Shutout, with two victories over Alsab, can "lock up" the three-year-old crown if he outruns the Sabbath star again today. The "Sab," who trailed Shutout in the derby and Belmont and beat him in the Preakness, will clinch at least a tie for the title if he wins.

Dodgers Remain Without Manager

New York, Oct. 21 (AP)—The post of general manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers remained open today but the presence of Branch Rickey for a reported "show-down" conference indicated today that the St. Louis Cardinals' executive had the inside track for the job.

Rickey arrived here last night by plane from St. Louis and, while refusing to comment on the Dodge's position, admitted he planned to sever relations with the Cardinals.

"I've heard the report about the Brooklyn offer, of course," Rickey said, "but I can not discuss it." Asked whether he planned to leave St. Louis, Rickey said: "Very definitely, I'm leaving—I've said that before. I hate to go, though, they're a great bunch of boys and it's a great town for baseball. They are a great sporting people."

Cronin to Enter Wartime Service

Boston, Oct. 21 (AP)—Manager Joe Cronin of the Boston Red Sox said today that acceptance of an offer to manage one of the Red Cross overseas recreation clubs satisfies an "urge to do something to help ever since the war started."

First big league manager to volunteer for war duty, Cronin revealed that he will return to this country to pilot his club during 1943 as his war service will only be temporary. The Sox mentor has two years remaining under the second of two five-year contracts with Owner Tom Yawkey.

Cruz Wins Bout From Leo Turner

Portland, Oct. 21 (AP)—Costello Cruz, Santa Barbara, Calif., middleweight, punched out a 10-round main event decision here last night over Leo (the Lion) Turner, Portland Negro.

Cruz began to draw away from his rugged opponent in the fifth round and several times Turner was on the verge of dreamland. The game colored boy weathered all that Cruz could offer, however, and managed to keep it fairly even for the first half of the fight.

Cruz weighed 158; Turner 157. Al Spina, one-time featherweight champion in the Pacific northwest, celebrated his return to the ring after an absence of seven years—this time as a welterweight—by hammering out a six-round decision over Bobby Dobrill, Los Angeles.
