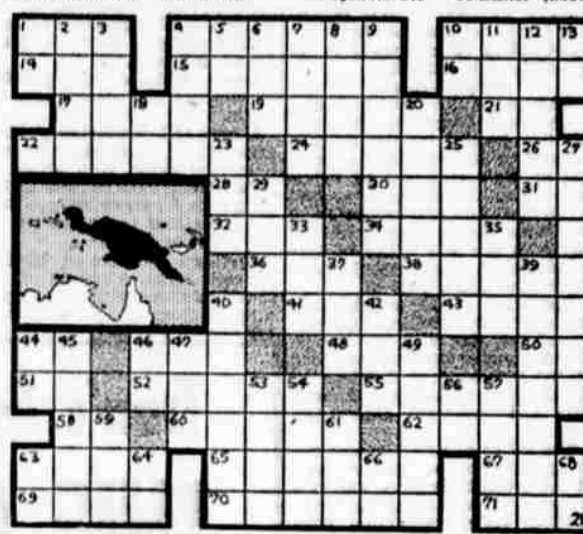

Nelson Halts Construction Jobs

Washington, Oct. 21 (AP)—War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson today ordered a halt of virtually all construction work which is "not directly essential to the war effort."

He revealed that he has given instructions to revoke priority assistance to a large part of non-military construction and also has ordered a review of all military projects with a view toward curtailment.

Notifying the heads of eight governmental agencies of his action, Nelson said that if the present construction program were carried out it would "absorb between one-fifth and one-fourth of the total war effort."

"As a result of aggregate demand of such projects for materials, labor, transportation and technical and engineering services is so great as not only to jeopardize the various military and essential civilian production programs in general but to force the most essential war projects dangerously behind schedule," Nelson declared.

"I refer particularly to the rubber program, the high-octane gasoline program, the aluminum and steel expansion programs, the aviation program, and other like items of the most critical essentiality."

The contemplated construction program for 1942 and 1943—including building, equipment and machinery—was estimated at approximately \$33,800,000,000, WPA officials said. Of this amount about \$16,000,000,000 was contemplated for 1943 and it is largely this work which will be affected by Nelson's order.

Action Taken on Appropriation Bill

Washington, Oct. 21 (AP)—The house today adopted a conference report on the \$15,851,196,887 appropriations bill providing the navy with funds to build 14,611 planes and authorizing 500,000 tons of aircraft carriers and 500,000 tons of cruisers.

The report retained a senate amendment requiring senate confirmation of all officials appointed during the remainder of the fiscal year who make at least \$4,500 a year.

The report eliminated a second amendment which would have permitted use of unexpended funds to complete the \$44,000,000 high level canal across Florida. Unexpended funds may be used, however, to improve the intra-coast waterway, as the original house bill had provided.

Hess Treated as Prisoner of War

London, Oct. 21 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the house of commons today that the government presently treated Rudolf Hess, former No. 3 Nazi, as a prisoner of war but saw no reason why he should not be dealt with like other war criminals, after the war.

He said no request for Hess' immediate trial had been received from Russia, where agitation that he be tried without waiting for the end of the war was growing. An official Russian statement to the refuges governments in London had suggested an immediate trial, and the newspapers Pravda and Red Star echoed the demand yesterday.

"In our judgment," Eden said, "there is no cause to apply to Hess treatment other than is being elaborated by the United Nations for dealing with war criminals. Hess is treated as a prisoner of war. There never has been or can be a question of treating him as an envoy or giving him any form of diplomatic privileged status."

Russian newspaper editorials had asked sarcastically whether Hess was "a prisoner or an envoy plenipotentiary." The allied governments are planning an international tribunal to try war criminals after the war.

Japs Forced Back In New Guinea

Gen. MacArthur's Headquarters, Australia, Oct. 21 (AP)—Allied ground troops have forced the Japanese into a new retreat in the Owen Stanley mountains of New Guinea while medium bombers of the southwest Pacific command smashed at enemy installations in the northern Solomons, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today.

The air forces returned to the support of American units facing a new battle on Guadalcanal island after a one-day lapse. They made the air field at Buin, Bougainville island, their chief target in a night raid carried out just before dawn yesterday. MacArthur said in a communique, and attacked enemy shipping in that area.

Steadily pushing the Japanese back toward New Guinea's north shore after their unsuccessful drive on Port Moresby, allied units advanced beyond Templeton's crossing, in the towering Stanley mountains.

Schools to Close For Convention

Redmond, Oct. 21 (Redmond)—Redmond grade schools will close Wednesday for the remainder of the week. All teachers will attend the regional convention of the Oregon State Teachers association which will convene in Bend Thursday and Friday.

While the high school has been closed for the past week and thus far this week for students to assist in the potato harvest, all teachers on the staff will attend the convention.

Principal E. R. Means of the high school announces that high school will open Monday following the two weeks' recess. The potato harvest will be 80 per cent over by the close of the current week, it is estimated.

Questions and Answers on Tire Purchase Plan Are Given

Questions that motorists have asked about the idle tire purchase plan are answered in the following list of questions and answers issued today by the office of price administration.

Q. Why is it necessary to sell my idle tires?

A. The rubber shortage is serious. Your government must have tires right now—today—to ration for essential use.

Q. What happens if I don't sell my idle tires?

A. National gasoline rationing starts November 22. If you or any member of your household, related to you by blood, marriage, or adoption, has more than five tires per passenger car after November 22, you will be denied the privilege of using gasoline in any passenger car you own.

Q. I have only four tires and a spare. Must I turn in my spare?

A. No. The government wants only your idle tires.

Q. What is an idle tire?

A. An idle tire is any new or used passenger type tire (even if it needs repairs) in excess of tires mounted on running wheels plus one spare per motor vehicle. Tires that are beyond repair are also idle tires, but should be sold to a scrap dealer.

Q. What will happen in the already rationed area if I do not file a tire record form?

A. Your local rationing board will demand that you surrender your ration book.

Q. Does this mean that I cannot drive a car after November 22 if there are more than five tires for each passenger automobile in my household?

A. It means exactly that. By government order, it will be illegal to use gasoline in your passenger car.

Q. What will I do when my own tires wear out. Put up my car?

A. No. Automobiles are essential. The purpose of this plan is not to take cars off the road—but to keep all cars on the road—yours included, for essential driving.

Q. What about synthetic rubber? Won't that solve the problem?

A. Not quickly enough. Unless

Stressing the vital need for women to help meet the growing need for skilled labor in war production plants, Eugene V. Clarke, director of the local vocational education school called upon Central Oregon women to enroll now in classes to prepare them to take their places in defense plants "to back up the men who must leave for the front."
