

# Leading Teams Favored to Win Today's Games

### In West, California vs. Stanford, Oregon vs. O. S. C. Featured

New York, Nov. 21 (AP)—Ohio State's Buckeyes attempt to clinch big ten honors when they clash with Michigan at Columbia today in a game that features a week-end football program with emphasis on conference play.

Other top games by sections sent undefeated and untied Georgia against dangerous Auburn at Columbus, Ga.; TCU faced Rice at Houston, Tex.; UCLA risked its rose bowl hopes against Washington at Los Angeles and Yale played Harvard in a traditional Ivy league tilt at New Haven, Conn.

**Big Teams Favored.**  
The nation's three major teams with spotless records—Georgia, Georgia Tech and Boston college—all were favored to continue their winning ways. Tech faced a romp against Florida, while the New England Eagles drew an equally easy assignment against Boston U.

Other southeastern conference games, in addition to the Tech and Georgia games, had Alabama playing Vanderbilt, Mississippi State against Mississippi, and Tennessee against Kentucky.

Texas Christian and Baylor, needing victories to deadlock Texas for the southwest conference lead, played Rice and SMU. Elsewhere in the south, unbeaten William and Mary met North Carolina pre-flight and North Carolina engaged Virginia while southern conference games listed were Davidson-Citadel, Furman-Clemson, Duke-North Carolina State and Maryland-Washington and Lee.

**Ohio Seeks New Victory**  
With Ohio State needing a triumph to clinch big ten honors, Wisconsin hoped to remain in the running against Minnesota while Indiana played Purdue. Great Lakes faced Illinois, Iowa pre-flight battled Nebraska and Notre Dame met Northwestern.

Intersectional tilts sent Detroit against Arkansas and Michigan State against West Virginia.

Tulsa, unbeaten and untied, needed to defeat Creighton to wrap up the Missouri valley crown, while Kansas State and Iowa were listed for the only big six contest.

## Track and Field Sports Favored To Build Up Men

New York, Nov. 21 (AP)—The national amateur athletic union will continue to stage big time track meets as long as sufficient talent is available, Executive Secretary Dan Ferris disclosed today.

Ferris explained, "these meets are important, not as mere spectacles, but as stimulants to the youngsters of the nation—particularly high school boys—to participate in competitive athletics, despite the natural distractions of the war."

**Aid To Men**  
"Reports to our organization from various service headquarters show that track and field men are among the best conditioned at the physical examinations and that they develop into excellent servicemen. In this connection, we should not forget that the youngsters of today may be the fighters of tomorrow."

Accordingly, Ferris continued, the A. A. U. has arranged its usual schedule of meets for the indoor season, and the annual convention at Chicago, Dec. 11-13, probably will map another normal program of outdoor competitions for spring and summer.

So much top-flight talent already has been absorbed by the services, Ferris expects no new track and field records for the remainder of the war. But he emphasized, "competition will continue to be keen in the various events."

**Games Scheduled**  
The major indoor meets begin Feb. 6, when the Millrose games are staged at Madison Square garden. On succeeding Saturdays there will be the Boston A. A. games; the New York A. C. meet; the national indoor championships at Madison Square garden; the I. C. A. A. championships, and Cleveland K. C. meet. The Penn. A. C. of Philadelphia was scheduled to hold its annual games on Feb. 12, but Ferris said that meet is still uncertain. Also uncertain are the New York metropolitan championships and metropolitan intercollegiate championships, because the New York coliseum, their usual site, has been taken over by the army. Catholic university of Washington, D. C., still is trying to arrange a date for its games.

Ferris said that all important track and field meets scheduled during 1942, were held except the national pentathlon.

## Two Plane Crew Members Missing

Portland, Nov. 21 (AP)—Two crew members of an army bomber which plunged into the Pacific off the Oregon coast yesterday near Gearhart are still missing, army authorities reported today.

The missing men, who parachuted into the choppy ocean as the bomber glided toward shore in an attempt to make an emergency landing, are Lieut. Leroy Kline, Chicago, and Sgt. Robert E. Pierce, Marmaduke, Ark. It was announced by Major W. C. Evans, public relations officer at the Portland air base.

Sgt. Albert Povolnik, Kansas City, Mo., was killed in the crash. The pilot, Lieut. W. S. Southern, Ellenwood, Kan., and Staff Sgt. William R. Dart, Weld, Colo., were injured slightly but are "getting along very well," Evans said.

## Wreck Blamed On Rail Parting

Seattle, Nov. 21 (AP)—Officials of the Northern Pacific railroad said today the wreck near Cle Elum yesterday which killed the engineer and injured several others was caused by an outside rail which parted at a joint.

The victim was Max J. Moon of Seattle. The first section of the train passed over the same track 18 minutes earlier without mishap.

## Willie Pep Wins From Old Boxer

New York, Nov. 21 (AP)—Willie Pep, master of the left jab and "defensive fade-away," wears the New York version of the feather-weight crown today by virtue of his unanimous 15-round decision last night over ancient Chalky Wright in Madison Square garden before the biggest fight crowd of the year.

Young Pep, who was born William Papaleo 20 years ago, garnered the championship decision before 19,521 garden fans—including more than 5,000 from Connecticut.

It was a grand battle in which Wright, whose age has been established variously from 30 to 40 years, flat-footed about the ring, waiting for a chance to land his explosive right. Meanwhile Young Pep circled about him on dancing feet, snatching with left hands every time ancient Chalky bowed into the beginning of a weave.

Those beautifully timed jabs kept Wright off balance most of the night.

The decision was unanimous, as handed down by Referee Arthur Donovan and Judges Bill Healy and Joe Agnello. They agreed with the United Press tabulation which registered 10 rounds for Pep, four for Wright and one even. Young Pep, hammering through his first 15-round bout, was staggeringly fatigued in the final round. But he had enough zing left because of his youth to win that session against the desperate attack of the older Wright.

Eugene, Nov. 21 (AP)—The Oregon State Rooks blasted the University of Oregon Frosh football team 27 to 0 here last night, scoring in each of the four periods.

Don Samuel and Roy Cole paced the Rook offensive, accounting for three of the four touchdowns. John Parino passed to Bob Grove for the fourth.

It was the second Oregon State victory. In an earlier game, the Rooks triumphed, 6-2.

The California middleweight scaled 157½, Turner 155½.

Cruz, who outpointed the Portland Negro a month ago in a torrid melee in the same ring, caught Turner with a thundering right hand in the second round to drop him to the canvas.
