New York, Nov. 21 (UP)—Demand for low-priced issues, particularly communication and mining shares featured a quiet and narrowly moving stock list today.

Most pivotal shares held near yesterday's final levels, with gains slightly outnumbering losses. However, a number of less prominent issues reached new 1942 highs in active turnover.

There was nothing in the day's business news to influence the market and traders apparently were disposed to operate cautiously. Reports from leading steel centers indicated operations may record another small dip next week.

Strength and activity in International Telephone domestic and foreign issues featured stock trading. The domestic, which opened on a 4,000 share block, was the most active stock traded. It hit a new high at 7 1/2, up 1/4. The foreign, second most active stock, reached a new high at 7 1/2, up 1/4.

and activities developed by the civilian war services branch of the local defense council.

Plan Summarized
The field representative summarized the purpose of the block plans as: 1. To carry forward civilian war activity, quickly and effectively. 2. To get vital information into every home, accurately and rapidly. 3. To collect information which may be needed for community war planning, and to bring back to the home answers to questions which have been raised. 4. To promote a spirit of cooperation in neighborhood enterprises, such as block hood meetings, rallies, car-sharing plans, the sharing of scarce mechanical and household equipment and any other activity of the community's war services.

George Simerville, Deschutes county defense coordinator, presided at last evening's meeting. Among others present were Mrs. Jess Tetherow, coordinator of the Redmond defense set-up; Mrs. Chris Kostol, chairman of the morale and recreation committee; Don H. Peoples, chamber of commerce secretary; Rev. R. H. Prentice, head of the youth participation committee; D. Ray Miller, chief of the air raid wardens; Tom Carlson, fire department chief and head of the auxiliary firemen; C. L. McCauley, civilian defense commander; C. C. Reiter, city manager; A. L. O. Schueler, chairman of the Deschutes county war bond staff and Mrs. Ethel M. Wilson, child welfare worker of the Deschutes county welfare commission. It was announced at the session that Bend will participate in an all-Oregon civilian defense incident drill on December 7. LeRoy Fox, D. Ray Miller and C. L. McCauley will work out details of the activity.

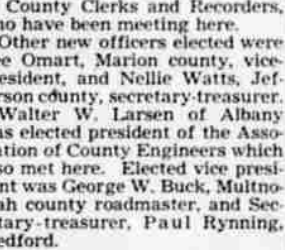
Madras Official

German Watch African Battle

Stockholm, Nov. 21 (UP)—The newspaper Allehanda reported from Berlin today that tension in Germany "is mounting hourly" regarding the outcome of the battle in Tunisia.

The Berlin report said that "big events" are believed imminent. The Germans were reported to be most curious regarding the morale and fighting ability of American troops which they have heretofore tended to deride.

German sources said that the North African battle ground should prove of "historic importance" since it provides a test of the quality of the new American soldier.

They asserted that the battle now under way "one day may perhaps be considered of equal importance with the battle of Carthage."

It was announced that mines had been laid in an area extending from the French-Spanish frontier to a point outside the Balearic islands and thence southward to the Algerian coast.

Germans Cornered
The allied forces, pressing eastward into Tunisia were reported to have driven the Germans into one defense perimeter in the Tunis-Bizerte area on the north-east coast and another at Gabes on the east coast.

American and British advance guards were reported to be feeling out the enemy strength at the Bizerte-Tunis perimeter already, preparing for the kill.

Radio Morocco said the Germans had concentrated a great amount of war material on the coast just northwest of Tunis, along the road to Bizerte, apparently planning to make their big stand there, and it was added that a violent battle was expected.

The British eighth army, chasing the Germans westward through Libya, occupied Benghazi and its forward elements established contact with the enemy near Agedabia, 100 miles southward and only 70 miles from El Aghelia on the gulf of Sirte, last favorable defense point short of far western Libya.

Bombers Active
Bomber planes in the Middle Eastern command, supporting the allied drive into Tunisia, bombed axis reinforcement airdromes in Sicily Thursday night, a Cairo communique said, and other planes left a 2,000-ton axis reinforcement ship sinking from bomb and torpedo hits and heavily damaged another.

British heavy bombers based on England made what was said authoritatively to be the heaviest raid of the war in Italy during the night, attacking Turin for the second time in three nights.

Radio Vichy reported that Benito Mussolini fearful of an allied invasion of the Italian coast, had ordered new combat units attached to all coast defense and anti-aircraft batteries in the coast area.

War Price Board Changes Hours

The office will be open to the public from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. daily, and from 10 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. on Saturdays. Reason for the later hours is the deluge of clerical work which confronts the staff. The staff will maintain the same working hours as before.
