

Scribes Select All Star Major Circuit Squad

Joe Gordon Gets Place On Big League Mythical Nine; Pesky Wins Place

St. Louis, Jan. 12 (AP)—The New York Yankees and the Boston Red Sox each placed three players on the 1942 all-star major league team, selected by the baseball writers association of America and announced today.

The team was picked for the sporting news in a nationwide vote of the 260 members of the association.

Only one member of the organization—Paul Scheffels of the United Press—nominated the team, man for man, position for position, that was chosen.

Seven newcomers were elected to the team—an annual fixture since it was inaugurated in 1925 by the Sporting News—but the American league dominated the all-star squad with six players to five for the National league.

Gordon Is Nominee
Joe DiMaggio in center field, Joe Gordon at second base and Pitcher Ernie Bonham were the Yankee nominees while Ted Williams in left field, Johnny Pesky at shortstop and Pitcher Tex Hughson snared spots for the Red Sox. Rightfielder Enos Slaughter and Pitcher Mort Cooper represented the Cardinals.

Johnny Mize won the first base slot for the New York Giants. Stan Hack grabbed third base for the Chicago Cubs and Mickey Owen tabbed the catching post for the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Seven newcomers to the championship squad were Bonham, Cooper, Hughson, Owen, Slaughter, Mize and Pesky, largest proportion of new men since the team's inception. Additionally, Pesky and Hughson were playing their first full season in the big time.

DiMaggio was voted a place on the team for the sixth consecutive time after being a unanimous choice three times previously. He finished fourth in the total vote, Gordon topping the list with 235.

Cooper Runner-up
Cooper followed with 250 and Williams with 247. Closest battle developed between Hack and Ken Keltner of Cleveland for third base, the Cubs' man garnering 95 to 91. Williams and Gordon were chosen for the fourth time and Hack for the third.

Boys in Uniform Given Training Used by Grapplers

New York, Jan. 13 (AP)—Modern wrestling, the "ugly duckling" of professional sports, provides the rough-and-tumble tactics so necessary in hand-to-hand contacts with the enemy, according to Rudy Dusek.

We encountered Dusek last night in a cold, bleak dressing room beneath St. Nick's arena, where he had performed in one of the show's feature events.

With a newspaper under his feet to prevent contact with the frigid concrete floor, squat Dusek towed himself vigorously after his shower before climbing into his clothes.

Dusek, a middle-sized man with about 200 pounds of muscle on his frame, shrugged off our attempts to interview him. He was in no mood for levity, with which wrestling currently is treated. His cauliflowered left ear was bleeding a bit. The entire left side of his face was reddish purple from bruises. And he was limping about because of the "bone line" in his left knee.

Tells Something Funny
Dusek, of the sparse brown hair and battered countenance, said: "You want me to tell you something funny about wrestling because everyone regards it as a joke today. Well I'll tell you something funny—the acrobatic tactics that have made wrestling the laughing stock of the land are the very things they're teaching our boys in uniform."

"During the past 10 years wrestling went acrobatic because the fans wanted to see action. They were not satisfied with the slow movement of two men on the mat. So the wrestlers concentrated on action off the mat—the flying tackle, the flying headlock, the airplane headscissors, the forearm-battering, etc."

"Maybe the kicks to the groin, the strangleholds, the eye gouges, the nose breakers and the arm crushers which we put over in pantomime were not as deadly as the fans might wish, but at least our play-acting taught us how to use them as killer weapons. If we so desired."

Is Tough Fellow
Dusek, a very tough fellow—always the bad boy in wrestling exhibitions—pointed out that Jack Dempsey, in training his coast guardsmen in commando tactics, did not have a group of boxers as instructors.

"No sir," said Dusek, "Dempsey—who realized the value of wrestling because of his refereeing experience, has wrestlers like Bibber McCoy, Joe Millich, Wilbur Neade, Lee Henniger, and George Bruckman, as instructors."

Bears Point For Game
Ever since the Panthers trounced the Bears just before Christmas the local high school team has been pointing for Friday's game, particularly working out plans to stop Joe Winters, high-scoring star of the Redmond team.

For the first time this year a definite combination seems to be working in the front court. Big Howard Smead, defensive ace of the team, has the edge for the center position. In spite of the fact that both have serious ankle sprains, John Prince and Gene Gillis have the forward positions well in hand. Both boys have been showing constant improvement and with Smead make an effective trio under both back boards.

The guard situation is causing more worry right now than any other, according to Coach Cook.

Guard Berths Problem
Under the system Bend uses, the guards set up and direct most of the offensive plays. While there are several boys who show promise in these positions, it is definitely a weak point in the Bears' game at this time. Cook is trying to develop two fast, clever, ball-handling guards who can contribute to the scoring. If this can be done the Bears have promise of developing into a first class ball club, he predicts.

Corbin Weber, letterman; Don Halligan and Bill Woods, juniors, and Vernie Wallen, sophomore, are battling for the guard positions at present.

Giants to Train In New Jersey

New York, Jan. 13 (AP)—New Jersey became the spring training site for a second major league ball club today with the announcement by President Horace Stoneham that the New York Giants would train at nearby Lakewood.

The private golf course of the late John D. Rockefeller will furnish the location for the diamond, which, Stoneham said, the club will construct. The estate is now a development known as Ocean County park.

The New York Yankees will pitch camp only 17 miles away at Asbury Park, N. J., but will use the Asbury Park high school stadium with an additional advantage of a large field house. Both of the clubs will be only about 65 miles south of New York city.

The Giants, in returning to a site that the team once used in the '90s, prior to the deluxe days at Miami, Fla., thus became the ninth big league team to join the movement for training bases nearer home as a war-time travel curtailment move.

Stoneham's announcement followed by only a few hours that of the Yankees and the Washington Senators, who President Clark Griffith said, would train in the capital.

Oregon Quintet Defeats Idaho

Moscow, Ida., Jan. 13 (AP)—The Oregon Webfoots coasted to a 33-21 victory over a sluggish University of Idaho basketball club in the northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball opener last night.

Roger Wiley, bean-pole Webfoot center from Bremerton, Wash., playing under the wartime conference rule admitting freshmen to varsity ranks, capped high scoring honors with a total of 16 points.

Another match is slated for tonight.

Time after time the ragged Vandal quintet stormed the tight Oregon zone defense and failed to score. At one point the invaders led 24-5 and the halftime score favored them 24-10.

In the second half Oregon easily held down the Idaho attack and widened the scoring gap. Fred Quinn, high scoring Idaho center, was off form, but managed to collect 11 points, over half his team's total.
