tribution of cash and bonds held by the water department, the amount totaling \$89,533.94, of which \$7,491.14 is in the First National bank, \$29,063.80 in the Bank of Bend, \$29,970 in U. S. bonds and \$23,000 in city bonds held by the water department.

Bonds Considered The U. S. bonds and \$5,000 in cash, which will probably be invested in war bonds, Reiter said, were placed in a bond retirement fund to apply against \$200,000 in water department bonds scheduled to mature in 1947. Interest and principal of bonds maturing in 1943, was given as \$12,166.67.

Five hundred dollars a month is provided to be added to the 1947 retirement fund.

The replacements and betterments fund was set up including \$23,000 in city bonds held by the department and \$8,000 cash. Because of the war, replacements and betterments to the water system cannot be made at this time, Reiter explained, and this fund will be built up to do this work when it becomes possible.

The fund will be increased by \$1,406 each month from the department depreciation schedule.

The operating fund retained \$14,397.29, and this is to be increased by the amount of revenue remaining each month above operating costs.

Allied Conquest Of All Libya Is Now Near Reality

Both Sides Get Set For Final Battle of Africa; Korps Flees

The allied conquest of all Libya is on the verge of completion and both sides are getting set for the final battle of Africa in northeastern Tunisia.

It obviously will be a difficult struggle and probably a long one. The beaten Afrika korps of Marshal Erwin Rommel is not expected to attempt a stand at Tripoli, nor to have any desire to do so.

Ultimately, however, Rommel is expected to withdraw to the northeastern corner of Tunisia. While he is estimated to have lost about 75 per cent of his tanks and mechanized equipment in the 1,000-mile flight across Libya, it is believed he can add upwards of 50,000 men to Armin's forces, making a total axis army of perhaps 120,000 to 150,000 men.

Such an army could put up a sturdy fight in the defensible Tunis-Bizerte area and might be able to hold the entire coast region from Sfax to Bizerte for months.

The axis has the advantage of shorter communication lines and some strongly defended positions. To offset this, the allies, superior at sea and in the air, are harrying the axis and so far this week have sunk 18 axis ships. The allied air force is blasting axis-held ports and communication lines with devastating effect.

The eventual outcome in Africa can scarcely be in doubt, however. The allies will be able to outmatch in manpower and equipment anything Hitler can get across the Mediterranean.
