## Group Instructed On Farm Canvass

Redmond, Jan. 21—A meeting of the Deschutes county USDA war board was held Wednesday afternoon in the Franks building. Purpose of the meeting was to instruct members and those selected to work in the field in a house to house canvass to assist farmers in working out a farm plan that will help his particular farm to contribute a maximum of the essential commodities needed to win the war. Willis Boegli, state farm field man, of the AAA, was present at the meeting and gave the instructions. Members of the war board, including representatives of the extension service, farm security administration, forest service, farm credit administration, agriculture adjustment administration, rural electrification administration, and soil conservation service, have prepared forms to be used in this canvass. The main objective of this canvass and sign-up drive is to enable maximum help to be given each farmer in developing and working out the most effective possible plan for his 1943 production, said E. M. Wright, chairman of the county war board. This intensive drive is to get underway at once. The grazing service, which is not represented on the war board, will nevertheless assist in the program by completing the plan in the range areas of the county.

## Your Federal INCOME TAX

No. 14  
**NORMAL TAX AND SURTAX**  
The federal income tax payable on the taxable income is divided into two parts, known as normal tax and surtax. The sum of these two taxes, in all ordinary cases, represents the local tax due. The exceptions arise in cases where there have been specified capital gains or losses, in which case an alternative computation is permitted, provided there are not long-term capital gains in excess of net short-term capital losses; or in cases where the taxpayer holds bonds with a tax-free covenant (bonds in which the issuing corporation pays part of the income tax on the interest), in which case a deduction of the amount paid by the corporation is allowable against the tax computed on the return.

The surtax is computed at variable rates, depending upon the amount of the surtax net income. The surtax net income is the amount of the net income of the taxpayer (gross income less deductions) less the personal exemption and the credit for dependents. This is the amount shown on line 23 of the income tax return, Form 1040.

On the first \$2,000 of surtax net income, the surtax is 13 per cent of the surtax net income. On surtax net income over \$2,000 and not over \$4,000, the surtax is \$260 plus 16 per cent of the surtax net income above \$2,000. On surtax net income over \$4,000 and not over \$6,000, the surtax is \$580 plus 20 per cent of the amount of surtax net income above \$4,000. The rate increases as the amount of surtax net income increases.

The computation of the tax for each income block is given in a table accompanying the return form.

The normal tax is calculated on the "balance subject to normal tax," which is shown on line 26 of the income tax return, Form 1040. The balance subject to normal tax is the surtax net income less the earned income credit, less interest received on certain types of United States government bonds and bonds of federal instrumentalities, and less dividends on share accounts in federal savings and loan association issued prior to March 28, 1942. The computation of the earned income credit is set forth in Schedule E of the return Form 1040, and in instruction 25 accompanying the return form.

The normal tax is 6 per cent of the "balance subject to normal tax," whatever the amount.

For persons filing a simplified return, the normal tax and surtax, as well as the earned income credit, have been consolidated into one computation, which is set forth in a table on the back of the return for each size class of income, so that it is necessary only to refer to this table to determine the correct amount of tax due. Any individual whose total income for the year is not in excess of \$3,000 and was wholly from salary, wages or other compensation for personal service, dividends, interest, or annuities, may use a simplified return (form 1040A).

## Men to Express Service Choice

Washington, Jan. 21 (AP)—National headquarters of selective service expects to be able to begin filling the manpower needs of all the armed forces through draft machinery around Feb. 1, responsible officials said today.

President Roosevelt, in his Dec. 5 manpower order, ended voluntary enlistments in the sea-going forces of men aged 18 and 37 and ordered that men in those age groups henceforth be obtained through draft boards.

Under the plan, as finally drafted by selective service, single induction centers will be established.

Men called for induction will be given an opportunity to express a choice among the army, navy, marine corps and coast guard. Their preference will be honored provided they meet the qualifications of the arm chosen and the quota of their draft board for that arm has not been filled.

## Seattle Faces Third Day of Bad Weather

Seattle, Jan. 21 (AP)—The weather bureau today promised Seattle a third day of heavy weather that already had slowed civilian activities and war industries to a virtual standstill.

A special forecast for Seattle and vicinity issued early today said: "Moderately heavy snow this forenoon, becoming mixed with rain in the late afternoon. Temperature range today 25 to 32. Five inches or more of snow expected today."

Crews resumed work at most shipyards today, but the Boeing Aircraft company announced it would stay closed until tomorrow. Schools also remained closed.

Trolleys and buses ran all night to prevent ice from forming on the streets. Nearly all lines were maintaining schedules.
